RANCH SALE.

A New Departure which has Millions in it.

Fat Steers - Waiting Pullmans - New Hotel - And other Gossips about Men and Matters Possessing Interest to the people of Las Vegas.

A Large Ranch sale

On yesterday J. C. Leary & Co. effected the sale of the Campbell & Austen ranch, near Watrous, to R. G. Head, T. H. Lawrence and J. C. Leary, for about \$100,000. This is the largest and most important sale New Mexico has known for some time. The property itself is probably the finest in the territory, consisting of about 20,000 acres, all under fence, and so situated with reference to the Mora and Sapello rivers that almost every foot of it can be irrigated and brought under cultivation. The residence upon it cost \$25,000 in the building, and is surrounded by an orchard of 500 bearing trees, and a garden capable of supplying the Las Vegas market with vegetables. There is a lake upon the ranch, covering at present an area of 300 acres, and plentifully stocked with several varieties of fish. In a word, it is a place as thoroughly desirable as one can well conceive. It is the purpose of the new proprietors to convert it into a fattening ranch, where range steers will be prepared for market. At present there are 300 acres in alfalfa, but they will proceed at once to raise the number to 5,000. After this they will continue to add to the acreage from time to time till the whole ranch is brought under cultivation. It is thought the management will be able to fatten from 5,000 to 10,000 steers yearly. And this is what marks the transaction as of such vital importance. It is a new departure, a startling cut on a new line, but one which is destined to make New Mexico immensely wealthy. There are at present some 1,200 head of imported cattle on the ranch, but they are retained by the estate, the administrator of which is to be congratulated upon having disposed of the real estate upon such excellent terms. It is also noted that this ranch lies almost wholly on the Seely grant, and the title to it is unimpeachable.

 Rev. T. L. Guilek left last night for Los Angeles, to be gone on a preaching tour of six weeks. During his absence Rev. Mr. Sumner and Prof. Ashley will fill the pulpit of the First Congregational church.
 Henry and Philip Winkler, Tacoma, Washington Territory, have sold to J. H. Wise for \$500 lot 24, block 24, Zion's hill, lots 19 and 20, block 6, Martinez & Fort's addition, and lot 8, block A, Rosenwald's addition.
 Fisk's Great Southwest has again been issued, to the number of 5,000. This is the most readable number of the paper so far sent out. It should be sent broadcast over the country, as it is calculated to do much in advancing the interests of New Mexico.
