FIGHT BEGINS ON WHITE PLAGUE

Dr. Mendel Silber Heads Albuquerque Society for Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis.

ORGANIZATION MADE AT MEETING LAST NIGHT

With the election of officers and the adoption of a constitution, the preliminary work in launching the Albuquerque society for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis was completed at a well-attended meeting of those interested in the fight against the white plague, held in the Central school assembly hall last night.

Dr. Mendel Silber was elected president of the society. Dr. E. McQueen Gray, vice president, Francis E. Wood, secretary, and A. J. Maloy, treasurer. An executive board, named by a committee appointed for the purpose, consists of Archbishop W. E. Warren, Dr. Robert Smart, Rev. B. T. Tolbert, Rev. A. M. Mandalar, S. J., A. R. McMillen, Dr. P. G. Conish, Dr. H. H. Kaufman, John Mihne and Simon Steen.

The meeting last night was an enthusiastic one, all those present being representative citizens and men who will assist in carrying on an energetic campaign for the cure and prevention of tuberculosis. The officers are men who are thoroughly sincere and in full sympathy with the movement. Dr. Silber, president, has made a special study of tuberculosis and is an ideal man for the head of the organization.

The objects and purposes of the newly organized league are set forth in the constitution and by-laws adopted last night. Following the adoption of the constitution, addresses were made by a number of those present, including Dr. A. G. Shorler, W. D. Sterling, Dr. Silber, Dr. John Vergine, Dr. Robert Smart, Rev. A. M. Mandalar, S. J., Archbishop W. E. Warren.

The constitution and by-laws, drafted by a committee consisting of G. S. Klock, Dr. Robert Smart, Rev. W. G. Warren, Dr. W. G. Hope and A. H. Stroup, and adopted last night, follow:

Article 1.—Name.
The name of this society shall be The Albuquerque Society for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis.

Article 2.—Objects.
The objects of the society shall be: 1st, The investigation of tuberculosis with special regard to its prevention, etiology and economic aspects; 2d, The dissemination of knowledge concerning the causes, treatment and prevention of tuberculosis; 3d, To enlist the cooperation of the people generally, the medical profession and nurses in fighting the disease, and preventing the spread of infection; 4th, The encouragement of the prevention and scientific treatment of tuberculosis; 5th, The securing of proper legislation for the relief and prevention of tuberculosis; and 6th, The cooperation with the public authorities, state and local boards of health, the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, medical societies, and other organizations in approved measures adopted for the prevention of the disease.

Article 3.—Meetings.
The meetings shall be held at such times and places as may be directed under the by-laws.

Article 4.—Amendments.
This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting without previous notice, or at any special meeting by first giving ten days' notice, which said notice shall be in writing and contain the proposed amendment.

BY-LAWS
Section 1.—Members.
Any person paying one dollar (\$1.00) or more into the treasury of the society shall be enrolled as a regular member for the year in which such payment shall be made.

Section 2.—Officers.
There shall be a president, two vice-presidents, a treasurer, a secretary, and an executive board of nine members, exclusive of the president and secretary ex-officio.

Section 3.—Duties of Officers.
Section 1. The president, vice president, secretary and treasurer shall perform the customary duties of their respective offices.

Section 2. The executive board shall be administrative, and pass upon such questions as may be brought before it.

Section 3. It shall appoint all committees for the proper carrying out of the work of the society. It shall formulate plans and programs of the work of the society from time to time as may be necessary.

Section 4.—Election of Officers.
The officers of the society shall be elected at the regular annual meeting of the society.

Section 5. All vacancies shall be filled by appointment by the president to hold office until the next annual election.

Section 6. The officers elected at the annual meeting shall take office on the January first next following their election, except that the officers elected at the first meeting shall immediately be installed and continue to serve until their successors are elected as herein provided.

Section 7.—The Annual Meeting.
Section 1. The annual meeting shall be held the second Monday in December at a time and place appointed by the executive committee. Notice to be sent to each member by the secretary at least ten days before such meeting.

Section 8.—Standing Committees.
Section 1. There shall be the following standing committees appointed

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ed by the executive board as before provided.

1. Finance.—To advise ways and means of securing funds to carry on the work of the society.

2. Membership.—To secure new members of the society.

3. Literature—Press and publicity.—To prepare and secure publication in the press articles, and to edit and prepare for gratuitous distribution pamphlets and leaflets, designed to educate the public as to the dangers of tuberculosis and the aims and objects of the society.

4. Lectures and Public Meetings.—To arrange for and have charge of lectures, exhibits and public meetings to educate the public on tuberculosis and the aims and objectives of the society.

5. Legislation and Law Enforcement.—To secure the passage of needed legislation and enforcement of existing laws designated to prevent the spread of tuberculosis.

6. Medical.—To supervise and plan the medical work of the society for the relief of indigent consumptives.

7. Auditing.—To annually audit the accounts of the society.

Section 2. The executive board may appoint such other committees from time to time as may be expedient.

Section 3. Instruction in schools.—To supervise and plan instruction to be given in schools.

Section 4.—Quorum.
Ten members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the society. A majority of the executive board shall constitute a quorum of said board.

Section 5.—Special Meetings.
Special meetings may be called at any time by the president or on a written application by three members in good standing.

Section 6.—Funds of Society.
The funds of this society shall be paid out only by order of the executive committee on checks signed by secretary, and countersigned by president of the society.

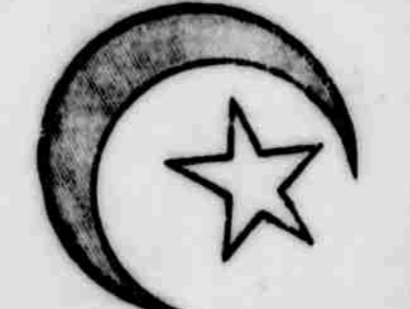

ALBUQUERQUE WOOL SCOURING MILLS BEGIN SEASON

Wheels in Big Plant Start to Grind and Every Indication Biggest Run on Record Will Be Made.

MILLIONS OF POUNDS READY FOR CLEANING

The Albuquerque wool scouring mills, the largest in the southwest, began the season's run yesterday morning and there is every indication that the run will be uninterrupted almost every pound of available wool for scouring in New Mexico, northern Arizona and other parts of the southwest is cleaned and ready for shipment to the east. James Wilkinson, head of the mills, returned last night from California and assisted by Office Manager W. E. Roberts, will direct the run.

A full force of employees was put at work yesterday. The run began with 125,000 pounds on hand, with 100,000 pounds additional in Albuquerque to be picked up when needed. It is expected that 100,000 pounds will be received early next week from Arizona and 150,000 in the next ten days from along the Rock Island railway in New Mexico. The mills last year, because of the conditions of the wool market and the unusually successful year enjoyed by the wool growers, were in every respect to believe that the run this year will be the best on record.

MOTORCYCLE SPEEDING MUST STOP, SAYS COURT

Accused of exceeding the speed limit on a motorcycle, George W. Weiser, chief clerk at the Santa Fe court office at Alamo, was arraigned before Judge George R. Craig in police court this morning. Weiser said he was one of the most careful motorcycle riders in town and never goes too fast. The court let Weiser off with a reprimand, but announced that reckless riding on a motorcycle in the city limits must stop.
