HAVEMEYER KEPT CONTROL ONLY BY MARGIN OF FEW SHARES

Big Sugar Trust, According to Official, Was Operated So That Stockholders Did Not Know Any of the Details.

COMBINE CUT DOWN PRICE OF PRODUCTION

Witness Before House Committee Declares That He Received \$900,000 for His Concern.

Washington, June 12.—A carefully guarded secret was the operations of the American Sugar Refining company up to less than two years ago, S. F. Atkins, the president and acting head of the corporation, told the house "sugar trust" investigation committee today.

The condition grew so onerous, the witness said, that the New England stockholders combined and obtained control. When they did so in 1910 they discovered, to their astonishment, that H. B. Havemeyer, the president of the organization, had maintained its supremacy with only 2,000 shares of stock.

The holdings of Mr. Havemeyer at the time of his death, Mr. Atkins said, were valued at about \$200,000, out of a total of \$2,000,000 in the American Sugar Refining company.

"That was a surprising discovery," he declared. "It had been generally supposed that Mr. Havemeyer owned the greater part of the stock."

Mr. Atkins said the purpose of the formation of the American Sugar Refining company in 1887 was to put on their feet a number of sugar refineries that had been operating at a loss.

Mr. Atkins said the companies had been working without profits for a number of years. The cost of production of refined sugar had been so great, said Mr. Atkins, that it was believed a merger of the refineries would result in greatly reducing this expense.

"I don't expect through this means to avoid some of the competition," said Chairman Hardwick.

"Well, I suppose it had some effect of that kind."

The witness said that 17 refineries joined in this merger in 1887, which was arranged by H. O. Havemeyer. He was unable to say what percentage of the refined sugar production they controlled.

Mr. Atkins said he received for his concern the Big Sugar Refining company, which he valued at \$200,000, from certificates of the securities of the refining company of a value of \$200,000.
