

**25,000 POSTCARDS SENT BY ONE FIRM**

**Record Output of Postals at Las Cruces; Large Wheat Crop in Mesilla Valley; Other News Notes.**

 Las Cruces, N. M., June 16.—The call of New Mexico was instituted by Governor William J. Sells, is receiving heavy cooperation in the Mesilla valley. One firm, the Francis L. The fields at Chamisa, Thompson, Canyon, and Roswell have an extra good stand and promise to give the largest returns ever recorded from a single crop in the valley. J. H. Eckman of Kilaheila, Ariz., arrived in the city Wednesday to open a stock stand in Roswell's building just north of W. B. Murphy on Main street. Mr. Eckman came to New Mexico a few weeks ago and after looking over the field, decided to locate in Las Cruces. He purchased a large stock of goods in the east and will ship at once.

The Mesilla Valley Produce exchange is making large shipments of apples. A few peaches are also being shipped. George W. Thorne, manager of the Mesilla Valley division of the Tri-State Telephone company, will leave the latter part of this week for Roswell, where he will be in charge of the Peoria valley division. J. H. McMillan of Roswell will succeed Mr. Thorne here.

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**OVER 160,000 ACRES OF DRY LAND ACCEPTED**  
**Committee of Water Users' Association Receives Applications for Large Amount of Water.**

Charles H. N. M., June 16.—Over 160,000 acres of dry land have been accepted by the Peoria Water Users' Association, subject to the prior right of the water rights already owned by the Cheabok project. In all 16,177 acres were signed up and were accepted by the committee, subject to the prior right of the water rights already owned under the Cheabok project, and to an appropriation of two and one half acre feet of water per acre. The lands for which water is asked are situated west and north of the present canal. The committee will now proceed with the business of securing the government investigation, the expenses of which will be defrayed by the association with money secured by an assessment of forty cents per acre on the dry lands signed up.

**MANDAMUS WRIT IS ISSUED AGAINST ROSWELL**

**Attorneys for Commission Advocates Obtain Order Compelling Council to Admit 28 More Names to Petition.**

 Roswell, N. M., June 15.—A writ mandamus has been issued by Judge Wm. H. Cope against the mayor and city council of Roswell, compelling them to produce in open court the names of the persons who signed the petition recently presented. The writ also orders the council to admit 28 new names to the petition. The petition to secure the writ was drawn by DeW and Barn, attorneys for the commission advocates, who are opponents of the present city politics and out of the petulant council. The petition followed the refusal of the council to admit the names of 28 persons to the petition because it did not contain the names of all the names on the petition. Judge Wm. H. Cope will not hear the proceedings because he is a taxpayer and property owner of Roswell, and is therefore an interested party. Some other district judge will be asked to hear the proceedings.
