WOOL PRICES STAY ABOUT THE SAME

The bulk of the transactions have been in the new clip. The market holds firm. Considerable offer territory is still in good, but supplies of fleeces and foreign products small. Estimates indicate the amount of the clip concentrated in Montana at approximately 20 per cent, the greater part being sold at 19 cents. Territorial around world are selling at 21 to 22 for the very best, while three-fourths Ohio is changing hands at 25 cents. Heavy receipts from the growers are reported from all centers.

WHITTLING OF STICK RESULTS IN DEATH FOR TEXAN AND MEXICAN BOY

Youth Stabs Through the Heart Man Who Scolded Him, Killing Him Instantly; Lynched by Mob Later.

HANGED TO PHONE POLE WITH TRACE CHAINS

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) Thordale, Tex., June 20.—The whittling of a stick led to the killing of Charles Zellman, a garage owner and the subsequent lynching of a Mexican youth here last night. Whether the boy was a citizen of the United States or of Mexico is not known. The Mexican, a lad of about 18 years, whose name has not been ascertained, was sitting on the sidewalk in front of Zellman's garage early last night, industriously whittling his pocket knife and making a pile of shavings. Zellman, protesting against the whittling of the entrance to his place of business, this, according to bystanders, angered the Mexican and he stabbed Zellman through the heart. The youth was arrested and lodged in the town jail. Shortly after nightfall a mob of about one hundred men gathered, stormed the jail and secured the Mexican with little difficulty. A Mexican ranch farmer was stopped and the four trace chains taken from his wagon. One end of the chain was fastened about the neck of the youth and the other end thrown over the beam of a telephone pole. The Mexican was hoisted about six feet from the ground and the body hanged for an hour before it was lowered.

MURDER AND ARSON CHARGES AGAINST GENERAL PRYCE THE LATEST

Leader of Socialist Army in Lower California May Find More Serious Trouble Than Breach of Neutrality Laws.

KILLING OF LARROQUE NOW LAID AT HIS DOOR

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) Los Angeles, Calif., June 20.—When C. Rios Pryce, former leader of the Lower California movement arrived in Los Angeles today in custody of a T. Elliott, United States marshal at San Francisco, to answer charges of violating the neutrality laws, he found that he also was accused of murder and arson. According to a complaint issued by H. T. Christian, United States commissioner of San Diego, and sworn to by Joaquin Diaz Prieto, Mexican consul at that city, Pryce is charged with the murder of Jose Larroque, lieutenant governor of Lower California, and with setting fire to the property of J. Avellano Salazar at San Joaquin. Pryce, who was arrested recently in San Francisco, made a general denial of the charges. He declared that Larroque was killed in a battle at La Jolla and that he personally had nothing to do with his death. Pryce was before United States Commissioner Van Dyke for a brief period but as he refuses from Washington had received there was no formal arraignment.

TRAVELLING SHOW MAN KILLED BY LIGHTNING

Grant Watkins, of St. Louis, Struck Dead While on His Way From Melrose to Encino on Belen Cut-off.

M., June 20.—Three miles south of town at 2 o'clock yesterday lightning struck one man from a group of three in a square riding and his horse instantly. The man was Grant Watkins, of St. Louis, traveling with a show troupe that had camped the night before and was going back to Elkins. He was sitting on a Winchester rifle in a room. The lightning struck him in the same place through a hole in the clothing and burned holes in his clothes. Watkins fell dead in the arms of his seatmate, William Hall and Clarence McCannell. The latter were rendered unconscious by the lightning. Twenty yards distant the squatters were startled.

Reports That President Would Decline to Attach Signature to Flood Resolution Are Not True; Action is Undecided

HE TOLD CURRY HE HAD TAKEN NO ACTION

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) St. Paul, Minn., June 20.—The trial of Frank M. Houston at New York for the killing of George E. Campbell at the Brown Palace hotel in Denver on May 24 began in the West today. Houston shot Campbell, whose name was at Victor, Colo., while endeavoring to shoot Louis Van Pelt. The 29-year-old defendant, who has been acquitted in the same attack. The present trial, however, is only the killing of Campbell. Houston's attorney, John T. Houston, endeavored to have the hearing postponed, pleading illness of important witnesses for the defense, notably Mrs. John W. Springer, but Judge Woodford denied the motion. The jury will be empaneled today according to law. Federal Attorney Willis Elliott and his assistants, John T. Childs and Edgar McComb, are conducting the prosecution. The crime was one of the most sensational in the history of Denver, an outcome being the firing of a shot by Van Pelt. The shooting was the result of a quarrel between the two men.

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SWEETHEART OF ROGERS MAY ASK PARDON

Rose Crawford, Pretty Los Angeles Girl in Las Vegas, Guest of Rogers' Parents; May Intervene Governor.

SENSATIONAL KIDNAPING CASE IS AGAIN REVIVED

Presence of Young Lady, Said to Be Fiancee of Las Vegas Boy, Kept Secret for Several Days.

(Special Telegram to Evening Herald) Las Vegas, N. M., June 20.—The sensational kidnaping case of three months ago, which stirred the town of Las Vegas from end to end, is again the talk of the town, this time because of the appearance in the city of Miss Rose Crawford of Los Angeles, whom it is said, was engaged to be married to Will Rogers, now serving a term of five to twelve years in the territorial penitentiary.

Will Rogers, it will be remembered, pleaded guilty to kidnaping his three-year-old nephew, Walter Rogers, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Rogers of Las Vegas, and grandson of Henry J. Walsh, chief counsel for the Santa Fe. The presence of Miss Crawford in Las Vegas has been kept a secret for several days. It is rumored that she has been here since last Friday as a guest of Mr. and Mrs. Rogers, parents of Will Rogers. Miss Crawford, it is said, called on Will Rogers in the penitentiary at Santa Fe last Sunday and had a long talk with him.

As the result of the interview with Rogers, it is said that Miss Crawford will make a second visit to Santa Fe and will call on Governor Mills and plead for a pardon for her lover. At the time Will Rogers was arrested, charged with the kidnaping, he made the statement that he did the job for the purpose of securing money, being anxious to marry a Los Angeles girl. Rogers, it will be recalled, received \$10,000 as a ransom for the return of his nephew. The \$10,000 was later found in a chimney in Rogers' room, where it had been secreted.

Joe Wiggins, convicted of complicity in the Rogers case, is serving a sentence in the territorial penitentiary of from seven to twelve years. Miss Crawford is a very pretty girl, intelligent and quick-witted. It is said that she loves Will Rogers dearly, as much as he loves her, and that she will leave nothing undone to secure his release from the penitentiary.

CRUSHED TO DEATH UNDER ENGINE AT RATON SHOPS

Brother of Albuquerque Man Meets Tragic Death When Laborer Mistakes Signal and Starts Turntable.

FRED WARDE VICTIM OF FATAL ACCIDENT

(Special Telegram to Evening Herald) Raton, N. M., June 20.—Fred Ward, 26 years old, was run over by an engine in the local Santa Fe roundhouse at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, being so terribly crushed that he died three minutes later. Ward was working on a bridge gang which was removing the ceiling on the bridge of the turntable at the roundhouse. A Mexican laborer, mistaking a signal given by a roundhouse employee and turned the table, preventing an engine to get on the bridge. Ward, working on the ceiling of the turntable, was crushed almost to pieces. A woman's infant was held in her arms, the baby rendered a vegetable, the death was caused by cerebral congestion. Ward had worked on the bridge gang for several months. He has a high school education, is an Albuquerque native and a member Mrs. A. Ward, in Santa Fe.

MORE CHOLERA IS FOUND ON SHIP

Steamer From Naples Arrives in New York With Passengers Ill From Dread Malady; Cases to Pest House.

New York, June 20.—Two cases of cholera have been discovered among the crew of the steamship Duca degli Abruzzi, which arrived from Genoa, Naples and Madeira. Both patients were taken to the pest house on Swinburne island and all the steerage passengers will be detained at Hudson's and for observation.
