

KING PARADES FOR LOWLIER SUBJECTS TODAY

Accompanied By Queen, New Monarch of Britain Drives About Great City With Cavalcades of Troopers.

INDIANS BRILLIANT IN SILKEN UNIFORMS

Despite Drizzling Rain, Thousands of Lenses Persons Stand About Streets and Cheer Loudly.

(By Evening Herald A. P. Leased Wire) London, June 23.—King George and Queen Mary today showed themselves to the masses as distinct from the more favored classes who were able to obtain access to the circumscribed area of yesterday's program.

The procession was on an even grander scale than that of the coronation. The route was more extended, including a circuit of some of the most populous districts of the capital.

The parade included four full squadrons of cavalry, representing all branches of that arm of the service.

Seats for many thousands had been erected along the route and the progress of the king and queen was indeed a royal one.

A drizzling rain fell as the royal carriage drawn by eight cream-colored steeds slowly came up Constitution Hill, but it did not dampen the enthusiasm of the crowds.
