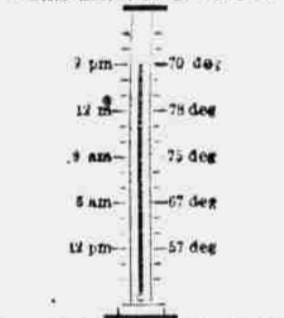

Figured from any conservative standpoint, it is estimated that the sum of \$3,000 per day is now being paid out in miners' wages in Santa Fe county's territory of ore producers, the Cerrillos, Dolores and San Pedro districts.

The White Oaks leader came to hand yesterday containing a two and a half column review of San Pedro, and in it Major Caffrey is honest enough to print the names of about 100 people who have left White Oaks and become citizens of our carbonate camp within the past few weeks.

It has been said that San Pedro is the second Leadville, and while the formation of the mineral belt may be very similar to the Leadville camp, there may be sufficient ground to warrant a different but individual opinion.

The Leader can not better represent, or rather present, the mineral claims of San Pedro as far as its relative boom is concerned than by sending home for public inspection, some samples of ore and vein rock which can be seen at the office of the Leader.

The company that now owns all of the San Pedro (which is located on the San Pedro tract) is called the San Pedro Mining company. This company now owns and controls 320 acres of patented lands which have been deeded to it by the Santa Fe Copper company.

The sale of lots and survey of the town site is in charge of Col. F. A. Blake, the secretary of the company. Lots are being sold at the low price of \$100 per acre by the company almost as fast as surveyed.

Wm. Bolander returned last night from Cerrillos, where he went to look after his branch harness shop. He is well satisfied with the start his business has made there.

The McKenzie Supply company has bought three lots at Cerrillos and will build a new store house. They paid \$1,200 for the property. All sorts of houses, particularly dwellings, are in demand at Cerrillos.

This will make an easy grade and will complete a good road to San Pedro by way of Dolores, and help Cerrillos not a little. It is a timely move.

Says the hostler: Ore has been brought to Mr. Leasing's regular assay, during the past week from a number of different strikes in Southern Santa Fe county, which is reported very rich and in extensive bodies. Something that will, when developed, cast all present workings in the shade.

John Patterson says that everybody in Peru regards the second contact strike of twelve feet of carbonates as the biggest find yet made in the Lucky-Lincoln, and that the miners have pinned their faith on the carbonate belt covering a much wider territory than many have heretofore been inclined to acknowledge.

Judge Thornton and Postmaster Seligman returned this morning from a trip of inspection about the Cerrillos district. They visited the Chester, and regarded it as an excellent property. There are now sixty sacks of high grade and a large quantity of lower grade ore on the dump, and at thirty feet deep the ore vein is thirty to thirty-five wide. It promises to be a great mine.

Cerrillos is shipping eight to ten car loads of coal per day, and would ship more but for a scarcity of cars—the old complaint. Harry Scranton is here to-day and states that yesterday an order came to land for twenty car loads of Santa Fe county's coal to go to El Paso.

The natural gas belt known to lie just south west of Cerrillos should be developed in the near future. This is one of the important steps that could possibly be taken in our interests. A good flow of natural gas here would at once decide the location of the biggest city in New Mexico, and would draw manufacturing interests to the area.

A good many land proprietors and home hunters are to be met hereabouts just now, the result of the A. T. & S. F. first "harvest excursion" from the central west into New Mexico. The train which brought these visitors out of Kansas City on Tuesday last required two engines to move it, and besides an extra train had to be run. It looks just a little as though immigration into New Mexico would be large this fall.

OFFICIAL GOSSIP.

EQULIZING THE TAXES. The territorial board of equalization had a session on Saturday afternoon. The Maxwell Grant company's property was reduced from \$3,000,000, to which it had been raised by the Colfax county board, to \$900,000, the amount at which the property had been returned by the company. In investigating the case the territorial board found that much the best land on the grant, that owned by Mr. Valdez, Hon. Frank Springer and others, had been assessed by the county board at from 45 to 65 cents per acre, while the grant company's holdings, much of it inferior land, had been assessed at more than twice that amount, hence it was deemed fair to cut down the grant company's assessment to an average of 75 cents per acre, including the lands under irrigation and to fix the price of the figures down to \$900,000. The board declined to reduce the Acema Cattle company's assessment and fixed the price of its cattle at \$8 per head. J. Placido Romero's sheep, some 4,000, had been returned at \$1 per head and the assessment on these was raised to \$2 per head. The Scottish Mortgage & Loan company was allowed \$200,000 just debts, an offset which brought their assessment down to \$60,000.

AN ARTISTIC SCROLL. Of the resolutions by the Republican league, thanking Miss Fountain for her handsome banner, and which were beautifully engrossed by Don Jose Segura, territorial librarian, the Las Cruces Republican says: One of the finest pieces of pen work ever exhibited in New Mexico came this week to Miss Maggie Fountain. It is the resolution passed by the national league at Albuquerque, on the occasion of the presentation of the beautiful banner which the Dona Ana county Republicans to victory last fall, and was executed by Jose Segura, territorial librarian. The resolutions are handsomely lettered and signed by President Morrison and Sec. Berger. A beautiful scroll surrounds them and the American eagle, with extended wings, soars over all; the banner itself is artistically reproduced as a center piece. It is to be framed and will make a handsome ornament that will always be highly prized by the young lady.
