Washington, Jan. 27.—The senate today passed a bill authorizing the secretary of the navy to contract for the use of a drydock at Hunters Point, San Francisco, Cal., for six years. The dry dock is to be large enough to accommodate the largest vessel that can pass through the Panama canal.

### An Automobile Mob Hangs Negro in Muskogee

(By Leased Wire to Evening Herald.) Muskogee, Okla., Jan. 27.—Benjamin Dickerson, a negro charged with the murder of W. A. Chaffin, a traveling salesman, at Oklahoma City, Sunday night, was forcibly removed from the Purcell jail early today by members of a mob who came in automobiles taken to Noke, nine miles north of Purcell, and hanged.

### STRAIT CUTS QUARTERLY MELON

(By Leased Wire to Evening Herald.) New York, Jan. 27.—The United States Steel corporation today declared its regular quarterly dividend of 1-4 per cent on the common stock and 1-2 per cent on the preferred stock.

The total earnings of the corporation for the quarter ending December 31 were \$11,048,749; the net income for the quarter \$17,205,925, and a deficit of \$1,092,174. These returns compare with total earnings at the end of the previous quarter of \$29,450,469, net income of \$29,422,188 and a surplus of \$11,248,778.

This money, Shaw admitted, was given to him by James G. Corcoran, a Pittsburgh contractor.

### BIG LINERS IN RATE WAR TO FINISH

London, Jan. 27.—Representatives in Great Britain of the Hamburg-American steamship line declared today that the rate war opened between the German companies is to be a fight to a finish. No quarter will be shown or expected between the Hamburg-American and the North German Lloyd. The first named company is preparing for war on all the traffic heretofore conceded to its rivals and will immediately resume its passenger service to the east and the far east, hitherto almost monopolized by the North German Lloyd. It also will invade the South American field.

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### Portuguese Cabinet Resigns

Lisbon, Jan. 27.—The Portuguese cabinet, headed by Dr. Alfonso Costa, resigned today as a result of the parliamentary deadlock and ministerial crisis which were brought about by the action of the opposition majority in the senate in systematically rejecting all the government's proposals.

### Biggest Bank in U. S. Joins Reserve System

(By Leased Wire to Evening Herald.) New York, Jan. 27.—Directors of the National City bank, the largest financial institution in the United States, voted today to join the federal reserve system. The vote, it was announced, was unanimous. In the financial district it had been known for some time that the National City bank would come into the system, although during the early stages of the currency legislation now enacted, it opposed certain features of the bill and there were rumors that it would surrender its federal charter.

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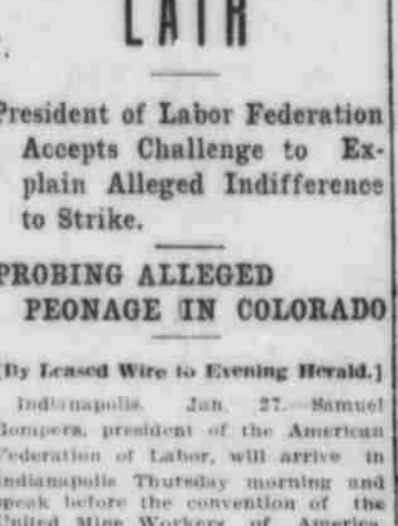
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## GOMPERS TO BEAR UNITED MINE WORKERS IN LAIR
