YOUTHFUL HOBO IS SHOT IN KNEE
 Night Station Officer Byrnes Also Injured in Disastrous Chase in North End of Yards Saturday Night.
 Raymond Bidwell, 18 years old, a youthful knight of the road, is in St. Joseph's hospital with a bullet in his right knee, and a bruise on his left which he says hurts worse than the bullet wound; Night Station Officer Byrnes of the Santa Fe is limping around on a painfully bruised knee, and Walter Dunkle, Bidwell's companion in adventure, is busy at work in the kitchen of the Myers cafe, all as a result of an effort of the two boys to get on train No. 5 in the north yards Saturday night, without the formality of buying tickets.
 The two boys beat their way into Albuquerque from Isleta on train No. 5 Saturday evening. They were seen getting off the head-end by the officer who took them to the depot for examination. They were allowed to go on their promise to keep off the blind cars. The officer, as is his custom, went to the north end of the yards as No. 5 was pulling out. He saw the boys running alongside the train and called to them to stop. They did not do so and the officer gave chase, pulling his gun, as is the custom when in action. Bidwell fell over a low switch stand, near the life company warehouse, got up and beat it faster than ever. The officer fell over the same switch and as his arm struck the ground the gun was discharged. The bullet caught Bidwell in the right knee. The boy was taken to St. Joseph's where his injury was attended by City Physician L. G. Hice. It was feared at first that amputation might be necessary, but today Bidwell is resting easily and no serious result is anticipated. The boy's mother, who lives in Kansas City, has been notified of the accident. Dunkle, who was arrested and wanted to stay with his pal and the police found him a job in the Myers cafe kitchen.
