

TELEPHONE MONEY BOX STOLEN FROM THE DEPOT

Thieves Calmly Carry Off Cash Receptacle from Long Distance Pay Station; Hop Fiend Sold Stolen Clothes.

Thieves last night ripped the cash receptacle from the Mountain States Telephone company's pay station booth in the Santa Fe depot and made away with the box. The company's records show that there was between \$9 and \$10 in the box. When the job was done is not known. One of the station employees entering the booth this morning found that the box had been pried from its fastenings and the instrument broken off. The station is open all night and an officer is on duty round the buildings, but he saw no suspicious characters around the station during the evening. The telephone booth is in the waiting room.

BROTHER BELIEVES BROTHER DIED IN NEW MEXICO

Texan in Search of W. C. Torbet, Believed to Have Been Found Dead in Sheep Herder's Tent After Six Months.

Does anyone in New Mexico remember of hearing of the fate of W. C. Torbet, believed to have been found dead last October in a sheep herder's tent after six months?

J. W. Torbet, a ranchman of Parker county, Texas, who last heard of his brother at Globe, Ariz., in 1911, in Albuquerque in the course of a search as a result of which he hopes to solve the mystery of his brother's fate.
"He wrote me from Globe, Ariz., in September, 1911," said J. W. Torbet today, "saying for me not to write to him again until I heard from him, as he was going to move. I never heard another word until some time ago a man named W. D. Dixon said he saw an article in some newspaper to the effect that the dissipated bones of my brother had been found in a sheep herder's tent, with his faithful dog, reduced to skin and bone, still watching the remnant of the herd of sheep he had been tending. According to the story, persons with whom my brother was raising sheep on shares failed to hear from him and started a search which finally revealed his dead body. This man Dixon didn't remember what newspaper it was or what part of the state; but he was sure it was in New Mexico. If I cannot get any kind of a clue I will go to Globe and try to trace my brother from there."

Anyone who remembers seeing such a newspaper item will confer a favor on the Texas if he will inform the Evening Herald. The missing man was 55 years old and single.

TREATIES ARE RATIFIED EN BLOC

Senate by Two-Thirds Vote Takes Action on Arbitration Agreements With Eight Countries.

BRITAIN AND JAPAN INCLUDED IN LIST

Washington, Feb. 21.—Without any amendment whatever to limit their scope, the senate by more than a two-thirds vote today ratified general arbitration treaties between the United States and Great Britain, Japan, Italy, Spain, Norway, Sweden, Portugal and Switzerland.

Attempts to repeal the Panama tolls on ships, on questions of immigration and public education, which were related to the treaties with Great Britain and Japan were defeated and the conventions go into new force in the same general terms as existed before they expired.

Ratification of the conventions clears the diplomatic atmosphere, so to speak, which has been charged and surcharged for months with complexities, relating to the Japanese protest against the California anti-alien land laws and British protests against the tolls exempting at Panama.

The British treaty had been held up particularly by those who were opposed to submitting the tolls question to The Hague. President Wilson's plan to repeal the exemption, including first, the ratification of the British treaty as well as the others.

Technically the senate ratified agreements to extend the treaties five years from June 1, 1912, the date on which they expired.

Administrating supporters hurriedly sent word to the president and he expressed deep gratification at the renewals.

NEW SWIMMING RECORD MADE

Robert Scott of San Francisco Olympic Club Defeats Duke Kahanamoku, Long Distance Champion.

Fifty-three More American Bluejackets and Four Officers Landed From Gunboat Wheeling.
