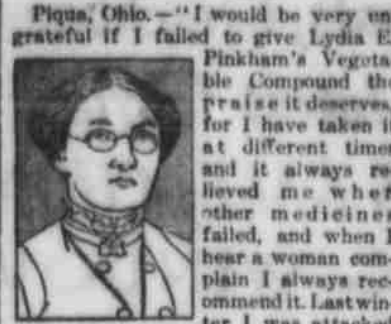

PETITIONS FOR THE COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL OUT

Three School Districts Vote Today and Next Week on Bond Issues for New Buildings.

Petitions for the signatures of voters, asking the calling of a special election to vote on the establishment of a county high school in Bernalillo county, were mailed yesterday and today to every school district in the county by County Superintendent A. Montoya and City Superintendent John Milne, under authority of the recent meeting between the city board of education and the county school directors. The petitions will be placed in the hands of teachers and school directors for circulation and it is expected that they will be returned within a week bearing the necessary number of signatures to legalize the calling of the election. The school authorities feel sure that the election will be asked for, as sentiment in favor of the county high school is growing rapidly as the details of the school and its field become better known.

Bond Elections Under Way.
A bond election is under way in the Rancho de Atreco school district today in which the people are asked to vote \$2,000 bonds for the erection of a new school building. It is expected that the bond issue will carry. Rancho de Albuquerque will vote on a \$4,000 bond issue for the same purpose next Saturday and the Del Rio district will vote on a \$1,000 bond issue on March 7th.

County Superintendent Montoya also expects that Los Gringos and Los Candelarias will soon ask for a bond election, including the merging of the districts and the construction of one fine school building.

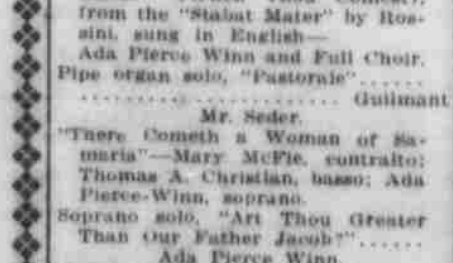
