155,000 for three seasons work as manager of Federal league team was wired to Christy Mathewson of the New York Giants by President Gilmore of the Federal league which read:

The offer was made in a telegram which read: "Christy Mathewson, Marlin, Texas. Newspaper reports state you did not take Federal league offer seriously. Get acquainted with Federal league officials and you will soon be convinced that we are not four-thimbers."

"I will give you \$15,000 for three seasons as manager of a Federal league club; \$15,000 in advance. If satisfactory meet me in New York Thursday at my expense. Wire answer CH-120. (Signed) 'JAMES J. GILMORE, President."

Gilmore would not say what club Mathewson would lead should he take the offer but it is supposed that Brooklyn in that event would be handed over to Christy.

**More Shifting in Federals.**

**OSBORNE CHAIRMAN OF NEW YORK COMMITTEE**

**Choice Unanimous and New Leader Declares Flatly Against "Advisory" Convention and for the Primary.**

New York, March 2.—William Church Osborne was elected chairman of the Democratic state committee this afternoon to succeed George M. Palmer.

The vote was unanimous. This was the first step in the reorganization of the Democratic party in this state following a recent conference in Washington between President Wilson and Governor Glavin.

In his speech of acceptance Mr. Osborne urged the party to "cast out but unhesitatingly with the people and the primaries" and make no attempt to defeat the spirit of the Democratic election reform. Thus he expressed his opposition to the plan of holding an "advisory" convention to recommend candidates to be selected by the primaries.

## BIGGER PURSES FOR FAIR RACE MEET APPROVED BY COMMISSION

**Eight Thousand Dollars Suspended for Horsemen on the Southwest Circuit in Week of Racing Here.**  
**ADDITIONAL PURSES ARE SAID TO BE COMING**

Bigger purses and better cards will mark the race program at the State fair next October. No less than \$8,000 in purses will be offered, the biggest sum that running and harness horses have ever had a chance to fight for at a New Mexico state fair.

In addition to the fattened purses to be hung up there, the lovers of horseracing will get the benefit of the retraction that lies in an enlarged circuit and a favorable place in the schedule. Some of the best horses to be raced in the west will be drawn to this city. The circuit includes the following nine cities: Cheyenne, Denver, Pueblo, Colorado Springs, Grand Junction, Eaton, Albuquerque, Prescott and Phoenix. The fair dates, October 5-19, will fall somewhere near the middle of the schedule.

Harness races will absorb \$7,000 of the purses. The association will devote \$1,000 to running races and other purses will almost certainly be made from other sources.

**Events and Purses.**  
The list of events, prizes and cards are as follows:  
Early Closing Stakes—2:18 trot, \$1,000; 2:30 trot, \$1,000; 2:18 pace, \$1,000; 2:30 pace, \$1,000.  
Late Closing Purses—2:24 trot, \$500; 2:24 pace, \$500; free for all trot, \$500; free for all pace, \$500.  
Special New Mexico Events—2:35 trot, \$500; 2:40 pace, \$500.

Special New Mexico events for horses owned and in the state not later than June 1, 1914, owner must have resided in state of New Mexico not less than one year prior to June 1, 1914.

**Tuesday, October 6th.**  
2:18 trot (stake), \$1,000; 2:18 pace \$500; five-eighths mile dash, \$150.  
**Wednesday, October 7th.**  
2:30 pace (stake), \$1,000; 2:31 trot (New Mexico Special), \$500; seven-eighths mile dash, \$125; four and a half furlongs, \$75.  
**Thursday, October 8th.**  
2:15 pace (stake), \$1,000; 2:30 trot (stake), \$1,000; Albuquerque derby, one and one-eighth mile, \$250; five and one-half furlongs, \$100.  
**Friday, October 9th.**  
2:40 pace (N. M. Special), \$500; free for all trot, \$500; five-eighths mile dash, \$150.  
**Saturday, October 10th.**  
Free for all trot, \$500; 2:18 trot, \$500; six and a half furlongs, \$150. Conditions governing the events are as follows:

**Time Allowances.**  
American Trotting association rules to govern.  
Under the new rules, a record made by a horse in a race he did not win, will be no bar.

A horse that has not raced, nor won a race will be allowed one second for each year from the time of last winning race. Four seconds allowed on records made on mile tracks racing over Albuquerque half mile track.

**Conditions of Trotting and Pacing Races.**  
Entries for Early Closing Stakes close June 1, 1914, when horse must be nominated and 5 per cent of stake accompany nomination with 2 per cent addition the night before the race. Nominators may withdraw without further expense by giving the secretary written notice not later than August 15, 1914.

Entries for late Closing Events, close September 15, 1914, when nomination must be made with 5 per cent of purse and name of horse.

All races to be mile heats, best three in five under the old system. Horses not favored. Association reserves the right to reject any entry, declare it off or change the order of program for any good reason given by the apud committee.

The secretary will notify all nominators of Early Closing Stakes by mail should they not oil satisfactorily. A horse that stamenes the field is entitled to first money only.

Early Closing Stakes to have eight entries of different interests to fill and four to start. Later Closing Events and Special New Mexico Events to have six entries to fill and four to start.

All purses divided 50, 25, 15 and 10 per cent; 5 per cent additional fee will be deducted from all money winners.

**Conditions of Running Races.**  
No entrance fee will be charged but 5 per cent will be deducted from all money winners. Purses divided 50, 25 and 15 per cent.

Entries for all running races must be in the hands of the secretary at 5:30 o'clock the evening before the race.

In making entries the name of the owner, the name of the jockey and colors, the name, age and sex of the horse must be given. Conditions of race govern weights to be carried. The association reserves the right to declare off all races that have not been started by 5 o'clock the last day of meeting.

Every horse entered must start, unless declared out by 10 o'clock a. m. the day of the race and 5 per cent of the purse must accompany written declaration. Not over twelve horses to start in any one race.

It is the privilege of the secretary to cut out any one or more horses in excess of the required number to start; the horse that has not started to have preference over horses that have started.

Applications for stalls must be made to the secretary, stating number of horses to arrive.

### HARRY RIEDE HERE FOR BOUT WITH TORRES

Likely Lad has Graduated From Featherweight Division and Says He is Out for New Class of Laurels.

Carefully toting a punch which he is carrying with him solely for the purpose of making things interesting for Jack Torres, Harry Riede of Denver, better known under his fighting name of little Johnny Murphy, came to town this morning. Train No. 3 hauled him in with an air of conscious pride.

With Riede came Bert Connors, his manager. They were met at the station by Mark Levy, impresario of the New Mexico A. C.  
Riede put the first few minutes of his time in town getting Director Levy to push the date of the meeting with Torres ahead from March 5 to March 9. He wants the extra time in which

to work himself into the pinkest of condition. He wants to put up the best fight of his career when he faces Torres, and means to make sure that he is in condition to give the fans a rattling exhibition.

"Riede has improved a lot since he was seen here," said Connors. "He has put on speed as well as weight. When he fought here before he was a bantam; now he mixes it in the light-weight division. The fans will see a lot of improvement in him."

Riede will begin training at the New Mexico A. C. gymnasium tonight at 8 o'clock, and the fans are all invited to drop in and see him in action. Lorry Floyd and other good local boys will train with him.

Torres is continuing his training at the gymnasium. He will work out there this afternoon. He isn't worrying about the Riede climb to higher pugilistic levels. He is certain he has everything necessary to cause Riede anguish and disappointment, and so are his followers.

### MATHEWSON SIGNS WITH NEW YORK NATIONALS

Great Pitcher Closes at Marlin, Texas, Turning Down Flat Offer of \$65,000 from Federal League.

Marlin, Tex., March 2.—Christy Mathewson today signed with the New York National baseball team, executing his contract with President Hempstead of the New York club.

Mathewson said he had received the Federal league offer of \$65,000 for three years, \$15,000 of this sum to be paid in advance.

When asked whether there was still a possibility for him to consider a Federal league offer Mathewson replied: "No, none. I have signed with the Giants. Furthermore the announcement of the Federal league that they will not try to get players who already have signed closes the matter." Mathewson said he did not feel at liberty to make public the terms of the contract which he had signed with the New York Nationals. His manner in discussing the Federal league offer seemed to indicate that he had finished negotiations with that organization.
