BEE KEEPERS OF STATE TO MEET IN ROSWELL

Annual Convention of Honey Producers to Be Held Wednesday of Next Week.

YOUNG TREES COMING IN BY CAR LOAD

Five Hundred Tons of Hay Held on Pecos Valley Farms, Bishop Howden Visits Roswell.

Roswell, N. M., March 16.—An important meeting of the bee keepers of the valley and state is to be held in Roswell on March 25. This is to be the annual meeting of the New Mexico branch of the National Beekeepers' association, the sessions of which are to be held at Eugie hall, matters pertaining to bee culture will be discussed and election of officers will be held.

Young Trees by Car Load.
The first of several shipments of young apple trees to be shipped in the spring for the South Springs project of the Pecos Valley Investment company arrived yesterday morning and Manager Wyatt Johnson of the Roswell Nurseries company was busy today looking after the removal of the trees from the 200-acre tract that is to be planted. Another car load is expected in a few days and by the end of the month it is expected all the trees will have arrived and been planted.

Five Hundred Tons of Hay Fed.
According to Frank Tolmages, Jr., a local hay merchant, there are about 500 cars of alfalfa hay now in the valley awaiting shipment during the next week or so. Of this amount he estimates that there are about 300 cars of choice hay, and this it is expected will be shipped out before the new hay from other points takes charge of the market. The remaining 200 tons of No. 1 hay, it is expected, will have to be carried over until next year.

Bishop Howden in Roswell.
Bishop Frederick W. Howden of the Episcopal church was a visitor in Roswell Sunday, coming here to pay his first visit to St. Andrew's parish. At the 11 o'clock Sunday service a class of six was confirmed. Mrs. Fay Allen, Catherine Morgan, Betty Ames, Cadet Ames, Warren and Peterson. The holy communion was observed at the close of a very fine address by the scholarly visitor, his subject being, "The Prodigal Son." Much of this service was especially fine, the choir being a large one.

SAN JUAN COUNTY MAKES CORN RECORD

Astec, N. M., March 18.—While San Juan county has been famed for growing nearly everything else under the sun it is only lately that she has begun showing what she can do with corn. The following from the Astec Index is most interesting:

A farmer near Flora Vista, John Luther, plowed up 46 acres of alfalfa land and put it in corn last year. From this 46 acres he sold more than 2000 bushels at an average price of \$1.32 per bushel—or a total of \$2,640 from the field. His yield was about 75 bushels per acre, and the income somewhat more than \$48 per acre.
