Prominently Identified With Church and Benevolent Work in Albuquerque for Many Years.

Mrs. E. A. Field, for more than twenty years a resident of Albuquerque, and during all that time prominently identified with the church and benevolent work of the city, died at a little past midnight at the family home on South High street, after a long illness. Mrs. Field was the daughter of Rev. N. M. Alger of this city, and a sister of Dr. J. J. Alger. She is survived also by her husband, a son, Morley Field, now on his way to Albuquerque from San Francisco, where he is in business, and a daughter, Frances. The funeral arrangements will not be made definitely until the arrival of the son.

Mrs. Field had been in failing health for some time. A year ago, son, Morley Field, came here for a visit, only to be stricken with appendicitis from which he died. Mrs. Field was an active worker in the church and charitable activities, she was one of the leaders in the work resulting in the establishment of the Young Women's Christian Association in Albuquerque, and in securing for it the present fine home the association owns.

**GEORGE ARNOT APPOINTED RECEIVER FOR BANOFF'S FUR COAT AND CAP**

Dr. Boris Banoff's petition to the district court for the appointment of a receiver to sell his fur coat and cap, in order to provide funds to discharge John Corsetto's bill against him for board and lodging, was granted by Judge Baylors in the district court yesterday. Corsetto, the plaintiff, is holding the coat and other personal belongings as security for the bill. The court named George Arnot as the agent to dispose of the coat and cap.

Banoff says the articles should fetch more than \$500 on sale, and Mr. Arnot was authorized to dispose of them if he could get more than the sum named. If he sells the coat and cap he is to turn \$250 into cash to be held in escrow until the amount of Corsetto's bill is determined under a petition for review filed by the doctor. All over \$250 is to be given to Banoff, who is in great financial straits.
