WRECK OF LIMITED AT BAGDAD MAY COST THE SANTA FE A MILLION
That the Bagdad wreck will cost the Santa Fe railroad almost a million in damage claims in suits on behalf of the dead and injured alone was the intimation given out by railroad officials yesterday, says the San Bernardino Sun. Officials of the claims department are busily engaged in settling up demands as speedily as possible in the hope of avoiding costly damage suits.
The wreck, coming within two weeks of the end of the present fiscal year, ruined a perfect record with "no passengers killed this year" marked on it. For five years the Santa Fe has carried its perfect record and the accident is a blow in more ways than one. Persons killed have been due to automobile collisions and similar disasters.
At 10:30 this morning at 10:30 o'clock the engine in the cases of Benjamin M. Cram and Charles W. Belden will be held by Coroner E. P. Fuller in the office of Justice of the Peace George R. Crane. The date of inquest was changed from yesterday, when it was originally set in order to allow a representative of the state railroad commission to attend. W. J. Handford will act in that capacity for the commission.
Relatives of the deceased, many of the injured and their families, officials and members of the crews will be on hand at the session. An Upland jury which saw the bodies of the two men who were killed as the train passed through Upland, will render the verdict at today's inquest.
At Bagdad yesterday officials of the Santa Fe took an inventory of the damage to equipment. The damages to the costly equipment of the dining car and composite cars and to the two locomotives will alone run into more than \$100,000, it is thought.
