Andrews Sounds Call of Party Loyalty and Elfege Baca Comes Back with an Open Letter Commenting Thereon

## RODEY ALSO HAS VIEWS ABOUT BACKING TICKET

In spite of the fact that today is the hottest of the season in Albuquerque, industry has been rampant among Albuquerque Republicans, and the political conversation mill has been working overtime. With three contestants for the Republican nomination for congress, Albuquerque in a day has sprung into prominence as the central hub of that party's political activity in the state. W. H. Andrews came out this morning with a further statement by his party associates, declaring that he would support the nominee of the Republican convention no matter who it might be.

This brought a formal public statement in the shape of an open letter addressed to Andrews from Elfege Baca, the first candidate in the field, and who was believed until Andrews entered the game to have the best chance for the nomination. Baca charges Andrews with bad faith; alleges that the former delegate promised him, Baca, the Andrews support for the nomination this fall, and gives assurance over his signature that if Andrews is nominated he will fight him to the final ditch and lick him. This assurance from Mr. Baca carries considerable weight in these parts and throughout the state. Mr. Baca also calls attention to some Republican party history which adds to the interest of the situation and sheds interesting light on the whole subject for those not familiar with Republican party events and struggles in the past.

Judge H. S. Rodey, also, comes back at the Andrews statement concerning party regularity with the assurance that he too will bolt the ticket if Andrews is the nominee. "Charging that Mr. Andrews 'stole' the nomination from him in 1904 by 'theft of proxies of instructed delegates,'" Rodey said this morning: "In view of this I wonder if he can expect that any self-respecting man could support him. I answer him no, ten times no; that I would not support anyone who gains a nomination that way. The decent, honest way is for the state committee to call a statewide primary and let that primary decide who the nominee shall be. In the convention run-off by the nominee of the people, not the bosses."

It is understood that several men who have claim to being simon-pure Progressives and who fought the Progressive fight in the state, are preparing to have something to say of Mr. Andrews' assumption of proprietorship of one Theodore Roosevelt and the party which he founded. Mr. Andrews today had nothing to say.

The situation at this time appears promising for further fireworks.
