POLICE PUT CHINA KID AWAY FOR SAFEKEEPING

If the El Paso Authorities Want James Moore They Can Have Him for the Asking. Picked up by Chief.

If the police of El Paso want the China Kid for any reason, they can have him. The local police have the kid safely caged, and will deliver him on demand.

The China kid's regular moniker is James Moore and he is what the police call an all-around thief. He is a rascal which, with an oriental cut of features, accounts for his sobriquet.

The kid's record as a crook is known here, and when Chief of Police McMullen spotted him on the street yesterday he naturally quizzed him, and just as naturally took him to headquarters. There an expensive-looking gold watch and chain were found on him, and he was promptly booked under a vagrancy charge to permit of investigation.

The kid said he had come here from El Paso and that he got the watch from a pal who was locked up down there. Chief McMullen wrote to the El Paso police about the kid last evening, and this morning Judge Craig gave him 30 days, so if El Paso wants him it knows where to find him.

The kid has never done business here, as far as the police know. He admits serving time in Colorado for burglary.

BOOM TIMES AHEAD FOR PLACER CAMP AT GOLDEN

Company Installing \$85,000 Worth of Machinery and that is Small Beginning of Development, Says Colonel Wood.

Things will soon be humming at the placer mining camp of Golden, N. M. Word of the progress being made toward systematic working of the old fields was brought to town today by Colonel J. A. Wood, of Golden, secretary and treasurer and general manager of the Santa Fe Dredging Company, which owns 570 acres of the most promising placer claims in the district.

By the middle of July or the first of August, Colonel Wood said, his plant would be in operation under the most modern conditions and that would be but a small beginning of the extraction of placer gold in the Golden district.

The Santa Fe Dredging company is installing eighteen cars of new machinery to supplement that already on the scene. Ten carloads have been received. Thirty-four men and fourteen teams are being used in hauling machinery. The dredges are being remodelled, and electric power will be used instead of steam. The new machinery is being installed at a cost of \$85,000.

When the installation of new machinery is complete the plant will be operated day and night. There has been a little delay in getting the new equipment, or the plant would be working now, Colonel Wood stated.

"The people in that vicinity," said Colonel Wood, "are enthusiastic over the outlook of the entire camp. The starting of our plant will be but a small beginning of the extraction of placer gold in that vicinity. There are 5,000 acres of proven ground that will doubtless be extensively operated."

The Golden placer fields are among the oldest in the country. It was at Golden that gold was first discovered west of the Mississippi.

"The field has never been worked systematically," said Colonel Wood. "The Mexicans merely gouged it, much as the Chinamen poked and scraped in California before the white men got down to the real business of extracting the metal."

Colonel Wood is going east this evening on business for the company. He will leave for Chicago on Santa Fe train No. 4.

ANOTHER DOCTOR TAKES WHACK AT EUGENICS

Smacks too much of lore of the Stock Dealer, Says Director of the Russel Sage Foundation.

Boulder, Colo., July 3.—"The object of the eugenists is a high and noble one, but their methods smack too much of the lore of the stock dealer," said Dr. Leonard P. Ayres, director of the division of education of the Russel Sage Foundation, before the University of Colorado sociological conference here today.

"They forget human nature. The improvement of the human race will come just as effectively through the improvement of educational methods and the inculcation of habits of personal hygiene in the rising generation."
