BIG ED WALSH BACK TO STAY SAYS CALLAHAN

Veteran of Chicago American League Club Performs with All Old Time Skill and Fans Give Favorable Judgment.

Chicago, July 6.—Big Ed Walsh is back to stay, was the comment today over the performance of the veteran pitcher of the Chicago American league club who yesterday started his first game of the 1914 season. Walsh pitched seven innings, holding the Cleveland batters to three hits. He struck out five and gave three bases on balls before giving way to a "pitch" hitter. In the seventh—the last inning he pitched—he retired the side on strikes. So impressed was Manager Callahan with the showing of the big pitcher that he announced that Walsh henceforth would take his regular turn on the mound.
"He looks as good as ever," Callahan asserted. "He displayed his old-time speed and seems to have regained control."
The White Sox, who have won fourteen of the last sixteen games, are tied with Washington for third place, and are only four games behind Philadelphia, the leaders.
