Since that election Alderman Skinner has voted to block every effort made by your mayor to carry out your wishes.

At the last meeting of the council he again voted to protect and legalize prostitution in your city.

COMMERCIAL CLUB WILL BACK THE MOTOR PARADE

President Cushman Sends Word to Twitchell that Albuquerque will be There with the Gasoline Procession

President C. O. Cushman of the Commercial club today sent a letter to R. E. Twitchell, president of the State Good Roads association, assuring him that Albuquerque not only would have a big representation at the state convention in Santa Fe July 20, but that the Commercial club as an organization would get behind the organization of a huge automobile parade here the morning of July 20th when the cars, not only from Albuquerque but from southern and eastern New Mexico, will assemble for the motorade to Santa Fe. Colonel Twitchell will have the expedition commission's motion picture photographer here to take several thousand feet of pictures of the procession, which it is planned to parade through the principal business and residence streets. In this way Albuquerque will have a complete photographic record for display in the New Mexico motion picture show at San Diego. It is this that especially interests the Commercial club and President Cushman is making a personal appeal to every owner of an automobile in Albuquerque to have a car in the parade on the morning of July 20th. E. L. Grose, secretary of the good roads association, is in active charge of the arrangements. Thirty cars have signed up to make the trip to Santa Fe. It is not expected that all the cars in the parade will make the trip to Santa Fe, but all will be asked to remain part of the parade until it passes the city limits on the North Fourth street highway.

STERN APARTMENTS CONTRACT TO BE LET SATURDAY

Twenty Flats in Beautiful Buildings at Gold Avenue and Seventh Street will have Every Modern Convenience.

Contracts for the construction of the Stern apartments, which Simon Stern, the Central avenue clothing merchant, is to build at the corner of Gold avenue and Seventh street, probably will be let Saturday of this week, according to Architect J. L. Ladriere, who drew the plans for the new buildings. The apartments, modern in every detail, and right up to the minute in convenience, will be built facing both on Gold avenue and on Seventh street and will include twenty separate apartments, ranging in size from two rooms, kitchenette and bath, to four rooms, kitchen and bath.

The new apartment building has been patterned after the most satisfactory models in use in similar residence construction on the California coast. Mr. Ladriere having spent several weeks in a careful study of the newer buildings in and around Los Angeles and San Diego. The apartments will be models of convenience. The sleeping rooms will be equipped with disappearing beds, the beds in some cases fitting in the wall and opening like a door, in others as sideboards and in still others as writing desks. Gas stoves, modern refrigerators, china cabinets, heat, light and water will be furnished all the apartments, the heat being from a modern central plant.

The new apartments are of sizes designed to meet a strong all-year-round demand in Albuquerque, and the buildings will be of the most important of recent improvements to the residence district of the city.

BARELA WAS ACTIVE AS TRAFFICKER IN BICYCLES

Overnight Developments Give Police Not One but Three Wheels to Worry About in Suspect's Case.

Prospero Barela, who said his name was Gutierrez when arrested yesterday afternoon, is furnishing the police a problem in bicycle ownership. Yesterday when taken into custody at the instance of Benton Jones, he had a bicycle claimed by young Jones. This morning there were two other bicycles of doubtful ownership in the case.

Prospero, whose home is in Old Town, said yesterday afternoon that he bought the Jones bicycle of Raymond Garcia of Old Town. Raymond's mother told the police that Prospero was romancing; her son hadn't sold a wheel to Barela. Then Barela said he got the bicycle in a swap with Juan Gabeldon. The latter told the police he got a bicycle from Prospero, but there wasn't any swap about it; he bought the bicycle for \$7, he said, but he hadn't paid Barela yet.

Then Barela shifted again. He said he got the Jones bicycle from a boy in Los Gringos. The Gabeldon wheel, he said, he got in a swap with a messenger boy. Chief McMillin had young Jones swear out a complaint against Barela before Justice Craig, and now the authorities are trying to trace the various bicycles back to their original and legal owners. The police suspect Barela of more or less extensive operations. He will probably be heard by Justice Craig this afternoon, but may be held pending further investigation.
