It was thereupon decided to place three of the letters in evidence but to read only one of them. This would be done, it was announced, after recess.

The question of the reading of the letters gave rise to another scene when the court reassembled.

Judge Albanel, who had talked over the matter with the lawyers for both sides during the recess, called Mme. Gueydan to the stand and Maitre Labori at once addressed her, saying:

"These letters will not be read by me, Madame, do you wish them back?"

"No."

"Well, then no one shall have them except myself. If you have heard of me being caught in a trap you are mistaken."

Maitre Labori appeared to regard Mme. Gueydan's seeming reluctance of yesterday and her impulsive consent that he should have the letters as a device to place him in the position either of suppressing the letters or of reading them to the disadvantage of Madame Caillaux. He asked her again:

"Madame, you wish to take these letters?"

Madame Gueydan—"No, sir."

Maitre Chenu—"Give to me the letters to tear them up."

Judge Albanel disposed of the question for the time being by saying the letters would be confined provisionally to Maitre Chenu as representing Mme. Gueydan, and to Maitre Labori as representative of M. and Mme. Caillaux.

The judge took occasion to announce that in accord with the jurors and the attorneys, the arguments would not be finished tomorrow, nor would the court sit on Monday.

Charles Post, of the Figaro; Etienne Frouchade, chief editor of the Journal, and Gustave Viteiros, a writer, then testified to their conviction from their knowledge of the late Gaston Calmette that he would not have published purely private correspondence.

ANOTHER PLAGUE INFECTED RAT IS RUN DOWN

Infected Rodent Found Seventeen Blocks from Scene of Original Outbreak of Bubonic Horror.

New Orleans, July 24.—Finding of another plague-infected rat—the eighth—was announced today by Dr. W. C. Rucker, federal assistant surgeon general supervising the fight against bubonic plague here. The rodent was captured in St. Ann street, fifteen blocks from the first case developed June 17. All officers of the transportation departments of the railroad and steamship companies have been called to a meeting today to get instructions from federal health authorities as to what they should do to aid in the plague fight.

William Ernest, employed in a saloon almost in the center of the bubonic plague infected district, was the tenth person to be stricken by the disease, according to announcement today by Dr. W. C. Rucker, assistant surgeon general. The saloon is at the intersection of Lafayette and Fulton streets. Ernest is 50 years old. He became ill July 17.

SANTA FE'S OFFICIAL EDITOR HERE ON VISIT

F. I. Vandegrift of Chicago, editor of The Earth, the Santa Fe railroad's crack monthly development and colonization journal, is a visitor in Albuquerque today, accompanied by J. E. Baker, general manager of the Pecos valley lines. Mr. Vandegrift has just completed a trip through the Pecos valley southern and southwestern New Mexico, in company with Santa Fe officials, during which he has gathered a mass of material for use in The Earth. Mr. Vandegrift says he has never known general conditions so bright in New Mexico than this and considers the outlook for development excellent.

WATER SITUATION AT TRINIDAD IS GRAVE

Recent Rains Cause Supply Mains to Burst and City is Threatened with Serious Famine.

Trinidad, Colo., July 24.—This city is threatened with a serious water famine and an order was issued today by Mayor Dunlavy instructing all citizens to cease the irrigation of lawns and restricting the use of the water for domestic purposes only. Heavy rains of the week have caused breaks in the city's water mains in the North Lake country, and owing to washouts on the railroad and the condition of roads repairs may not be made for two weeks. The damage resulting from floods of the past three days is now estimated at \$150,000. This damage is to bridges, pipe lines and telegraph lines.

COLIMA AND MANZANILLO IN HANDS OF VICTORS

El Paso, Tex., July 24.—Colima, capital of the state of that name, and Manzanillo, important west coast seaport, have fallen into the hands of the constitutionalist troops under General Obregon, said a report received here today from General Alvarado, at Guaymas.

Colima was taken after several days' fighting. Manzanillo was evacuated by General Talles, who had fled there from Guaymas.

The report stated that the troops and families of the officers shipped south on the steamer Juarez to Salina Cruz.

Reports from the west declared that the Yaqui Indians were again on the war path in southern Sonora, having sacked several villages. The Sonora troops were endeavoring to quell the uprising with little success.

HUERTA AND PARTY ARRIVE AT KINGSTON

Kingston, Jamaica, July 24.—General Huerta and the party of fugitives from Mexico accompanying him, arrived here at noon today on board the German cruiser Dresden from Puerto Mexico.
