

THE PASSING OF JOHN HAY, POET, EDITOR AND STATESMAN



Newbury, N. H., July 1.—At 12:25 this morning, Secretary of State, John Hay, died almost without warning to his family and physicians.

His Life and Labors. John Hay was born in Salem, Ind., October 8, 1838.

It was Hay's guidance that led to the United States' taking the lead in the diplomacy of the Orient.

Had Hay never shone as a diplomatic star he would be remembered as luminous in the world of literature.

His greatest work, undoubtedly in popular estimation, was the thrilling story in verse of "Jim Bludso, or the Wreck of the Prairie Belle."

Some people scorn Jim on the grounds that he was immoral—that he had two wives—but who that has ever read the story will forget the magnificent heroism that sent him to his death while he saved the passengers under his charge?

"Little Breeches" is another of Hay's efforts popularly cherished, and like "Jim Bludso," in later life, Hay hated to hear of it.

But people prefer "Jim Bludso" and "Little Breeches." It is remarkable of Guonod, who proclaimed his famous march in Faust as mere rot, composed to please an ignorant public fancy, yet that march will be hummed, probably, when the pretentious orchestrations of the opera are forgotten.
