New Line Assures Future of Central New Mexico

FINE FARMING COUNTRY

From Belen to Texico is Vast Expanse Suited to Agriculture.

(On board the first train from Albuquerque to Texico over Belen Cut-off.)

For many years the citizens of east and west New Mexico have longed, wished and waited for the time when they could visit each other as neighbors and run over for a day instead of packing for a long trip and going around through two or three states. For two years the consummation of that hope has seemed so near and yet like the ignis fatuus has vanished when the moment of realization drew near.

Through Isleta and on down through Los Lunas and to Belen the trip was over the old line of the Santa Fe down the Rio Grande. At Belen the train struck the new road bed which makes a junction at this point with the El Paso line.

Belen is well known to western residents of the Territory. Here John Becker and the Santa Fe railway have started in to make a city and from the looks of the splendid old valley farms surrounding the town and the new buildings going up with the extensive railway improvements, the success of the plan seems quite assured.

Belen Turned Out in Force.

The old mill which has ground wheat and corn for more years than many a resident can remember is yet doing business and is one of the prominent buildings to be noted. Three new hotels can also be seen, and an excellent two story structure which is the home of the First National bank of which M. W. Flournoy, of Albuquerque, is president and L. C. Becker cashier.

From Belen to Mountainair no important stations are passed. At the entrance to Abo Pass which is the only possible pass through the mountains south of the main range is seen the great rock crusher which has furnished so much of the ballast which with the heavy steel rails and careful grading makes this one of the easiest riding lines in the whole country.

Mountainair the Ozone City.

Mountainair, about thirty-two miles from Belen is most appropriately named. Here indeed is the Ozone City. The altitude is about 6,500 feet and it is surrounded by fine growths of cedar, juniper and pine trees which abound on the eastern slope of this mountain range.

ated two saw mills which furnish lumber at about half the price which other towns pay. The lumber has only to be hauled about twelve miles. Most of the ties for the new railroad were brought from the mountains and loaded at this point.

Willard a Thriving Town. It is down hill to Willard, fifty miles from Belen. The ambitious little city which because of its being a junction point with the Santa Fe Central railway, and many other natural advantages, aspires to be the leading city of the Estancia valley.

Willard has a wideawake Commercial Club of which E. P. Davies, the leading legal light of Torrance county, is president, F. Walrath, secretary and John T. Kelly, is perhaps the main booster. The Torrance County Savings Bank, H. B. Jones, president, Duncan McGillivray, vice president, and E. P. Davies, cashier, has its own fine building on the best corner of the town and is doing a good business.

Vaughn a Division Point.

There are no stations of note between Willard and Vaughn and Vaughn is notable only because it is the junction point of the Eastern Railway and the El Paso and Southwestern railroad. The town is situated on the very ridge of hills which divide the Estancia valley from the valley of the Pecos and because of this water is not to be found at any depth.

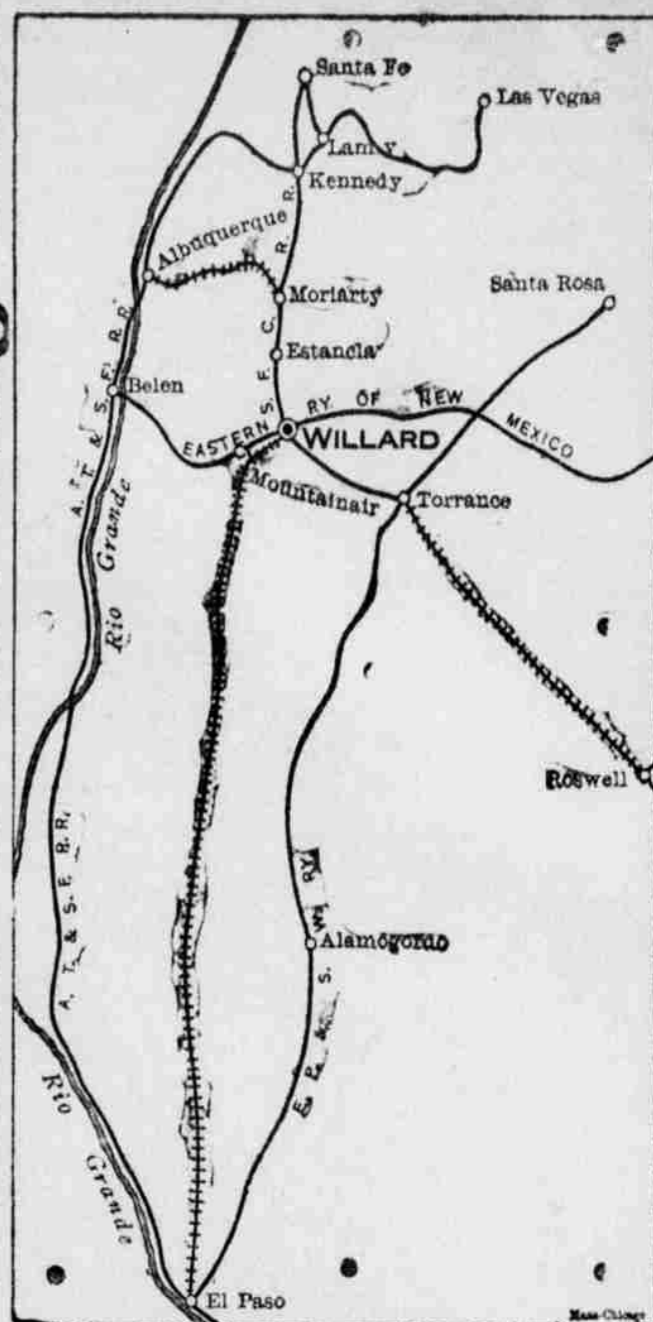
The railway passes through the immense sheep pasture of ex-Governor M. A. Otero, and ex-Secretary James W. Reynolds. The land is seemingly worthless except for pasture purposes and the owners have little to fear as to the entrance of colonists to drive them from their range.

Great Steel Bridge Across the Pecos.

The Pecos river is spanned by one of the finest steel bridges in the west. It is built high above the river and has so great a length of approach to the river bed that it is practically secure from danger of washouts. The bridge cost more than a million dollars and was many months in building. Across the river is the remains of the little railroad town of Sunny-side.

La Lande just five miles east of Fort Sumner, is a promising little place whose chief chances of making it go are the splendid quarries of fine building rock which lie right at its doors.
