THE PARCEL POST WILL MAKE ANSWER

THE STAMP CAN SOLVE NOT ONLY THE HIGH COST OF EGGS BUT THE HIGH COST OF ALL OTHER FARM PRODUCE

During the past ten years or so the muckrakers have been busy. In city after city and in town after town they have uncovered crookedness in the administration. They have uncovered so much crookedness that the rest of us have come to the conclusion that graft is something which is confined to public places. But is there no graft in private places? It is worth considering.
Suppose the mayor of a town should appoint his brother police commissioner; his daughter's husband, fire commissioner; his uncle, superintendent of the water works; and put his son in charge of the street cleaning department. How long would it take before the good citizens would hold an indignation meeting?
It would not be long. No city in America would stand that kind of graft.
Yet pick up the letter head of a private corporation and what are you likely to find?
It usually reads something like this: Quiney Persimmon, president. Quiney Persimmon, Jr., vice president. Persimmon Quiney, treasurer. Howard Lemon, secretary.
The presence of Howard Lemon in this select family circle is somewhat puzzling until one learns that Prunella Quiney Persimmon is the wife of Howard Lemon. Then all is clear.
To be sure, the general manager of the concern, who is the man to see on any matter of special importance, is a man named Hobbs or Smith or Hogan, but it soon happens that the salary of the general manager is just about what it costs young Lemon to run his motor for one year. The work is not all done by the family, but the big salaries are all in the family.
The Persimmons own a good deal of the stock, but they do not own it all. They don't even own half of it, but they have what is called a voting control. By means of this control they keep themselves in places where the salaries are good and growing better. Sometimes they make new places when it is necessary for the proper support of the family. For instance, the offices of secretary and treasurer were both held by Persimmon Quiney until young Howard Lemon was his wife. Then it was found necessary to divide the work, and Lemon was made secretary.
Has there ever been an American mayor who has dared to run his city as this private corporation is run?
In their leisure moments the Persimmons, the Quineys and the Lemons, are constantly advising their fellow citizens of the danger of permitting an American city to advance one step toward the sort of municipal work which is done by a great many foreign cities with success. The reason against this is given as the graft in public life.
To say that there is more graft in the average city government than there is in the average private corporation is demonstrably untrue.

THEIR PALMY DAYS ARE ALL GONE NOW

Washington, Dec. 8.—It's pretty tough to be a member of congress these days.
It was hard enough when it became known recently that there would be no mileage appropriations this session and that the exigencies of the public welfare required congress to cut out the Christmas recess.
The crowning indignity though was thrust upon members when it was learned that the disbursing officers of congress hold that under the income tax law the tax to be paid by statesmen would be "collected at the source." In other words it will be deducted from members' compensation before they are paid off.

RAIDS OWN HOME HIS TO SPITE WIFE

Philadelphia, Dec. 8.—To spite his wife, it was testified, William E. Shanklin, a negro policeman, raided his own home and arrested several men, with whom he had been playing cards a few hours before.
That testimony was given by Mrs. Shanklin, when she had her policeman husband arraigned in desertion court. She said the raid on their home took place about three weeks ago, with her husband leading the raiders.
Mrs. Shanklin said her husband got "mad" at her in the course of the card game and threatened to "pull" the house. Shortly afterward he went out, only to return with several other cops. Judge Carr ordered him to pay \$4 a week for his wife's support.
