The system of peacag still exists in Mexico. In case of debt, the debtor's personal services, or wages earned from another employer, belonging to the creditor until the debt is paid; but it now does not apply to debts over \$10. If a man trusts another more than that sum, he does so at his own peril, if he has no property. He can command his services up to \$10 worth, but no farther. The old life servitude is thus done away with to a great extent, although many of the lower classes manage to keep perpetually in debt, and consequently, perpetually slaves.
