G. PERRAULT,

of the firm of Perrault & Galles, is well and extensively known throughout Grant and Sierra counties—having lived in this country for over twenty years; during which time he has done as much, if not more, to advance the resources of southern New Mexico than any other man in it. We are going to elect Perrault, and by doing so we are electing a good man for the position.

PLATFORM.

We, the representatives of Sierra county in convention assembled at Hillsboro re-affirm our devotion to the republican party, and our adherence to its principles.

We endorse the action of the last territorial Republican convention and the platform adopted at that time.

We declare that our last delegate to congress of the United States has clearly demonstrated his utter inability to properly represent the great and growing interests of this territory, whereas, he introduced in to congress 123 measures, he only succeeded in having three of them passed, and they were of no practical benefit to our people. We declare, further, that in the cause of ridding this territory of the hostile Indians, he put forth no intelligent effort, and that he did not even earnestly present to the government the facts concerning the ruin and desolation that the hostilities wrought in New Mexico.

We support the nomination of Col. J. W. Dwyer to be our next delegate in congress, being fully convinced that his past experience in public affairs, coupled with his acknowledged energy and ability insure to the people proper representation before our government, and the people of the east.

We believe that the public expenditures, both county and territorial should be strictly guarded in order that the burden of taxation may be as light as possible.

We declare that the democratic party is alone responsible for the rapid decline in the value of silver, not only because of the determined anti-silver doctrines of the President, but also because of the failure of congress to take any steps to protect the silver industry by conference with other leading nations looking to the adoption of a standard value for the metal. That such a move would prove helpful, is shown by the recent advance of silver, since the appointment of a royal commission in England for such a purpose.

We denounce the action of the President in appointing to certain federal offices in this territory men who have proved failures in every other field of life, and who have used their official position since coming here for the purpose of satisfying political ends of the basest order, and who by their public and private acts have discouraged the investment of eastern capital within our borders.

We believe that all just dues or expenses incurred by the militia during the recent Indian raids should be liquidated by the territory, but that all exorbitant prices should be resisted.

We declare that the doctrine of free trade as taught by the democratic party is one which, if it should become the law of this nation, would bring the wages of the

silver miner down to a par with the wages of the miners of Cornwall and other parts of the old world, and that the protective policy as instituted and maintained by the Republican party, vouchsafes to American labor a just reward. We pledge ourselves to support the Republican nominees in Sierra county, and to work earnestly in all honorable ways to secure their election before the people.
