Agriculture Forest Service THE SIX RULES

For Care With Fire in the Mountains.

If every member of the public strictly observe these simple rules, the great annual loss by Forest Fires would be reduced to a minimum.

1.—Be sure your match is out before you throw it away. 2.—Knock out your pipe ashes or throw your cigar or cigarette stump where there is nothing to catch fire.

3.—Don't build a camp fire any larger than is absolutely necessary. Never leave it even for a short time without putting it OUT with water or earth.

4.—Don't build a camp fire against a tree or log. Build a small one where you can scrape away the needles, leaves or grass from all sides of it.

6.—Don't build bonfires. The wind may carry the time and start a fire you can-
