Notice is hereby given that on the 24th day of July, 1917, in accordance with Section 26, Chapter 40, Irrigation Laws of 1907 Edward Crouch, of Caballo, County of Sierra, State of New Mexico, made formal application to the State Engineer of New Mexico for a permit to appropriate the Public Waters of the State of New Mexico.

Such appropriation is to be made from Las Antenas Creek at a point whence the N 1/4 cor. Sec. 30 T. 15 S., Range 5 West, bears N. 44 deg. 30 min. E., 988.2 feet distant (1) whence NE. Cor. Sec. 30 (same Twp. & Rng.) bears N. 88.7 feet distant (2) whence the same corner bears N. 38 deg. 40 min. W., 224.5 feet distant, by means of diversion works and three-feet six in. pipe, is to be conveyed to lands in Section 29, Tp. 15 S., Range 5 West by means of main canals and laterals and there used for the irrigation of twenty acres and domestic purposes.

Any person, firm, association or corporation deeming that the granting of the above application would be truly detrimental to their rights in the water of said stream system shall file a complete statement of their objections substantiated by affidavits with the State Engineer and serve a copy on applicant on or before the 22nd day of October, 1917, the date set for the Engineer to take this application up for final consideration unless protested. In case of protested application all parties will be given a reasonable length of time in which to submit their evidence in detail or arrange a date convenient for a hearing or appoint a referee satisfactory to all to take testimony. Appearance is not necessary unless advised officially by letter from the State Engineer.
