

LEGISLATION AT ALBANY.

Commissioner Edmund Stephenson's turn to enlighten the sub-Committee of the Congress on Immigration on the affairs of Castle Garden came yesterday. He said he had been appointed a member of the Board of Emigration in 1913. The State Board was organized in 1847. In 1882 the Federal Government entered into a contract with the State Board, and in the same year a head tax of 50 cents for each immigrant was imposed. This tax is used for the general expenses of the Board.
