

**GREECE CALLS VOLUNTEERS TO FIGHT BULGARS**  
All Reserves Near Serez  
Also Summoned to Arms to Repel Invasion.

**EXPECTED QUICKLY TO JOIN THE ALLIES**  
Liberal Leaders Now Raising Troops at Salonica to Meet Attacks.

**HUNGARY LOOKS FOR RUMANIA TO FIGHT**  
Censor Permits Press to Voice Pessimistic View of Outlook.

**London, Aug. 23.—**The Bulgarian advance into Greece may be the spark that will set Greece aflame and lead her at last into the war on the side of the Allies. Despatches from Salonica say that all the Greek reserves about Serez, in northeastern Greece, have been called to the colors and at Salonica volunteers are being raised to fight the Bulgars.

A proclamation issued by the Greek commander at Serez says that he will attack the Bulgarians, who are now advancing toward the town. The proclamation calls out all the Greek reservists in the district, who were demobilized a short time ago, after having been under arms almost since the very beginning.

Salonica leaders of the Liberal, Radical and Social Democratic parties of Greek volunteers to go at once to Serez and aid the Greek troops there to repulse the advance of the Bulgarians. Greek troops already have been reported as firing on the Bulgars. It has been declared that the latter had promised not to occupy Serez, Drama or Kavala.

**Eyes on Greece and Rumania.**  
It is believed here that the Teutonic offensive, intended to anticipate the offensive which the Allies have now started, has reached its climax. Bulgaria is being drawn into Greece to so arouse the Greeks against their ancient foe that they will be ready to join the Allies.

**EARTHQUAKES IN CALIFORNIA.**

**U. S. FISHING BOATS SEIZED.**  
Two Taken by British and Conveyed to Shetland Isles.  
LONDON, Aug. 23.—The American fishing schooner Maxine Elliott, 111 tons, of Gloucester, Mass., and the Lisie Griffin, 107 tons, of Bangor, Me., seized while fishing off the coast of Iceland by British patrol boats, have been taken to Lerwick, Shetland Islands, and are being held there.

**LIEBKNECHT GETS 4 YEARS ON APPEAL**

Prison Sentence of German Socialist Is Increased by 19 Months.

AMSTERDAM, via London, Aug. 23.—The result of Dr. Karl Liebknecht's appeal against his sentence for treason has been the imposition of a new and severer sentence of four years and one month penal servitude and expulsion from the army, according to a despatch from Berlin.

The appeal of the Socialist leader was heard on Wednesday before a supreme court-martial presided over by a naval captain. The other members were two lawyers, two majors, a captain and a lieutenant. Liebknecht was defended by Herr Bracke of Brunswick. The public was excluded after the hearing but a sentence was announced at an open session.

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**WILSON ASSAILED BY GERMAN CATHOLICS**

**IMPATIENCE SHOWN BY BROTHERHOODS**

Proposal Made to Go Home and Let Leaders Arrange Strike.

**MORE TIME NEEDED TO FORMULATE PLAN**

Messages From All Over Country Commend Position of Executives.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Another day of deliberation on the part of the railway executives failed to bring perceptibly nearer the solution of the problem upon which a national railroad strike depends.

The executives' committee of eight, struggled to devise a plan which would meet the ideas of the President and prove acceptable to the employees of the four brotherhoods. When the committee members met with their colleagues and the railroad managers to-night they reported that they had made no progress.
