

AUSTRIA SENDS ARMY TO WEST TOSAVETRIESTE

Hungarian Troops Shifted From Rumania to Aid Gen. Bordevich.

ITALIAN DRIVE IS STILL VIGOROUS Total of Prisoners Taken in Carso Fighting Is Now 9,000.

NEW THRUST MADE ON CADORE FRONT King Victor's Men Take Advantage of Offensive to Make Advance.

ROME, Nov. 4.—Herculean efforts are being made by the Austrians to stop the victorious advance of Gen. Cadorna's troops toward Trieste. The Italians are still pressing on, however, making more progress along the line of the Wipacch, east of Gorizia, on the Carso plateau. The total prisoners taken up to the present exceeds 9,000.

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Thrust on Cadore Front. The Italians are taking advantage of the situation to thrust forward on the Cadore front, between the Dolomite and the Carnic Alps, where they have taken advantage of the Carso plateau on the southern slopes of Cima di Rocche, about 100 meters from the summit. In the Carnic Alps the fighting of both armies was especially bitter today, making the front a active fighting some 200 miles.

DR. DUMBA RETIRED AT HIS OWN REQUEST

Washington Regards Action as Indicating New Austrian Envoy to U. S.

VIENNA, via London, Nov. 4.—Dr. Theodor Konstantin Dumba, former Austrian Ambassador to the United States, at his own request has been relieved from the diplomatic service by the Emperor. The announcement of the retirement of Dr. Dumba includes imperial recognition of Dr. Dumba's excellent services covering a long period.

Sufficient time having elapsed since his recall to make this pleasure clear to the world, the official view is that Austria is now ready to send another Ambassador to this country. For more than a year the Embassy here has been in charge of subordinate officials, and Austria has been the only one of the great powers to do this.

Regular Army Inexporably Have Engaged Venizelists Outside Katerina.

LOANON, Nov. 4 (Sunday).—The Greek army arrived outside Katerina and an engagement with the Venizelists began to-night, says a despatch to the London Times from Athens, Friday.

308 NEUTRAL SHIPS SUNK Lloyd's Gives Record of German Navy Since War Began.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Lloyd's records, hitherto unpublished, reveal the fact that 308 neutral ships of a gross tonnage of 421,353 have been sunk by the Germans since the war began.

TEUTONIC POWERS WILL FREE POLAND

Governor-General von Beseler of Warsaw to Issue Proclamation To-day.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 4 (via London, Nov. 3).—According to a Berlin despatch received here, Gen. von Beseler, Governor-General of Warsaw, will issue a proclamation to-morrow, saying that the German and Austrian Emperors have agreed to establish an independent State of Poland with a hereditary monarchy and a Constitution. A precise definite concerning the frontiers of Poland is reserved.

Hope to Recruit Army of Poles. The proclamation of an autonomous Poland by the Central Powers has been forecast recently in many despatches. In the Entente capitals this action has been regarded as an effort to recruit an army of Poles to fight the battles of Germany and Austria.

Plan to Fight Russians. The Kaiser, it is said, wants a German Prince as the King, and Francis Joseph would like to proclaim himself King. Either would order a general mobilization to defend the independence of the country, that is, to fight the Russians.

NEW U. S. INQUIRY OF CAR SHORTAGE

Interstate Commission to Extend McChord Hearing to Entire Country.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The nationwide shortage of freight cars, the most acute for years, will be the subject of a general investigation covering every part of the United States. The Interstate Commerce Commission announced to-day that the investigation would go into questions of supply, exchange and return of freight cars, with the view of issuing such orders as the commission may deem appropriate.

Seek to Increase Demurrage. The railroads already have taken one step to help themselves in their dilemma by filing tariffs increasing demurrage charges on cars either loading or unloading. They want this increase effective December 1, but shippers, as in the past, have protested against it and may force either suspension or cancellation of the demurrage tariffs.

May Call Conference to Help. LOUISVILLE, Nov. 4.—Proposals that for the immediate relief of the country-wide railroad car shortage the Interstate Commerce Commission call a conference of the executive heads of the railroad conferences of the East, South and West were communicated by railroad representatives late last night to Commissioner C. C. McChord, who has been presiding over the informal inquiry held here.

PERSHING TO RENEW PURSUIT OF VILLA

Commander of U. S. Forces in Mexico Said to Have Orders to Take Field.

EL PASO, Texas, Nov. 4.—According to the most reliable reports obtainable to-night northern Mexico is in a greater turmoil of banditry and revolution than at any time since Francisco Villa began his operations against the Government of Victoriano Huerta, over three years ago. Disorder prevails everywhere.

Villistas Capture Three Cities. It is confirmed, though not admitted by Carranzistas, that Villa or some of his forces captured Parral on October 31, as persistently rumored here for the past three days, that in addition they also have taken Santa Rosalia and Jimenez and are now in such a position as to prevent assistance being sent from the south to the city of Chihuahua.

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HUGHES, CHEERED 37 MINUTES IN GARDEN, DECLARES FOR AMERICA COURAGEOUS; 70,000 MARCH IN GREAT NIGHT PARADE

Hughes in Motor Car Heads "Mammoth Wheel of Flame."

SWEEPS UP FIFTH AVE. FOURTEEN ABREAST Pageant of Lights and Oil Capes Recalls Great Campaign of Blaine.

PARADE MANY HOURS PASSING UNION LEAGUE Financiers March Side by Side With Laborers in Biggest Night Turnout.

The "Mammoth Wheel of Flame" and "The Spirit of '76" were but two of the fanciful names for the big torchlight parade of factory hands and financiers, lawyers and day laborers and butchers and bakers and candlestick makers that swung up Fifth avenue last night.

Manhattan had had a long, long wait to see a political torchlight parade of the oldtime Cleveland-Blaine campaign brand. Perhaps the younger voters of the present generation never had seen one.

C. H. Sherrill in Marshal. That estimate of 70,000 was not altogether an estimate. At least that number of marchers, according to actual figures, were on the parade.

Bomb Story Is Exploded. An explosion of flashlight powder a few feet from Mr. Hughes—the details of which are told in another column—was not the cause of the explosion.

Like a Mighty Gate Fire. Standing on the top of the incline at Fifth avenue and Thirty-seventh street and looking south toward the marching marchers one got a fair notion of what the spectacle would seem like from a grand stand seat in an aeroplane.

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M'CORMICK GIVES 70 VOTES TO HUGHES

Claims 364 Positively for Wilson and Bulk of 97 Remaining. SEES ONLY A LANDSLIDE Predicts Reduced Pluralities in Every Republican Stronghold.

WANE C. McCormick, President Wilson's campaign manager, in a forecast yesterday which he described as "my first formal and my final estimate," conceded absolutely to Hughes only six States with a total of 70 votes in the electoral college.

Claims Nine More States. The President's campaign manager went on to predict in this way: "Included among the close States and classified as 'Probably Democratic' are nine, with 52 votes in the electoral college, as follows:

More Than 70,000 in Line. While this was going on inside the Garden—and political observers of twenty-five years experience were saying they had never seen anything like it—more than 70,000 men were marching northward in Manhattan in the kind of old-fashioned torchlight procession that was so familiar to the generation that knew William Howard Taft and that had passed out of fashion by the time McKinley went to the White House.

Mr. Hughes's Arrival. Gov. Whitman was speaking—speaking with voice, hands and feet almost—tearing into Seabury like a tiger, when the Garden crowd of 14,000 sensed Mr. Hughes's arrival. At a shout, their instant perception of the fact that the candidate was in the building.

Calls Ohio Typical. "The State of Ohio is typical—Ohio has never before cast its electoral vote for a Democratic President, save in 1876. Candidate Sets Vast Crowd Wild With His Strong Americanism.

MRS. HUGHES APPEARS BY NOMINEE'S SIDE He Exhibits a Baby Elephant That Causes Great Enthusiasm.

CHEERING GOES ON WITHOUT BAND MUSIC Crowd Sings "Star Spangled Banner" and "America" in Fine Style.

New York city climaxed Charles Evans Hughes's campaign for the Presidency with a demonstration last night which may possibly have been equalled in excitable years but which certainly was never excelled.

In Madison Square Garden, where the fitful, sporadic cheering for Mr. Wilson ran twenty-nine minutes last Thursday night while thousands fled for the exits, more than 14,000 people roared thirty-seven minutes last night for the Republican candidate—a solid, unbroken, car-dimming salute.

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
