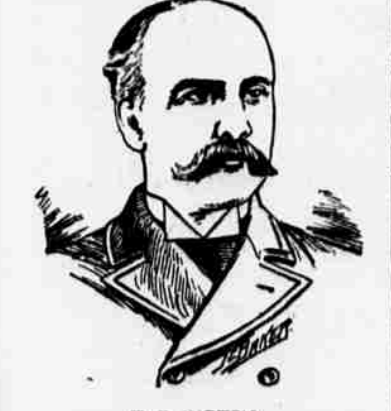

**CHICAGO'S GREAT DAY.**  
Impressive Dedication of the World's Fair Buildings.  
15,000 Troops Drawn Up to Receive the Distinguished Guests.  
Vice-President Morton Rides at the Head of the Procession.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—In the presence of 100,000 people, and amid the echoes of the largest chorus assembled in the history of modern times, the World's Columbian Exposition was formally dedicated to-day by the dignitaries of the nation.

At 4 o'clock this morning a gun out in the darkness on the Lake Front Park began to boom. As the dawn broke the skies were clear. Providence had drawn down below the sunbeams every cloudy curtain and the reddening East brought further assurance that the day would be clear.
