TESTIMONIAL TO SATOLLI

It is in the Nature of a Petition Signed by Many Priests.

The following petition signed by Rev. Dr. R. L. Burtzell, of Houdout, and other prominent priests of the dioceses of New York, Brooklyn and Newark, will be forwarded to every priest in these dioceses to-day for his signature and approval:

We, the undersigned priests of the dioceses of New York, Brooklyn and Newark, wish to protest against the efforts and the long language used against the Holy See and the most Rev. Delegate Mr. Satolli in the *Public Herald*, especially in the numbers of Dec. 11 and 26, 1892, in its columns upon a letter from the Holy Father upon the *Herald* of Dec. 12, 1892, purporting to come from St. Louis. We consider the tone as not only unbecomingly but as unbecomingly and unbecomingly in the name of the Holy Father upon the relations of Catholics to the public schools.

The petition will be presented to Mr. Satolli as a token of esteem for his work. Father Corrigan, of Hoboken, was credited with having written the petition, but he denies that he did so. He says, however, that he was asked to sign it.

Mr. Satolli gave a banquet yesterday at his home in Hoboken in honor of his thirty-sixth birthday, and several of the priests who signed the above petition were present. Bishop Wigger was invited, but could not attend.

NEW JERSEY SENATORIAL FIGHT

James Smith, Jr., Credited with the Votes to Win.

A bitter fight is now waging in New Jersey politics, between Gov. Abbott and James Smith, Jr., the political leader of Essex county, for the seat in the United States Senate which is soon to be made vacant by Rufus Hodge.

The fight is one of the most interesting that has agitated New Jersey politics in years. Gov. Abbott has long been shipping his political life with a view to succeeding Governor Hodge.

Mr. Smith's candidacy, it is said, was pre-announced by his political friends. He has, it is believed, the support of a large number of the Legislature, and has further succeeded in winning the delegation from Hudson county, which is now Abbot's home.

Alvah McLean, the chairman of the State Democratic Committee, is managing Gov. Abbott's campaign, while a very active politician in Newark named Connolly is managing Mr. Smith's forces.
