

JIMMY GOES TO 'STIR' AND STANDS DISGRACED FOR CHEAP \$15 HOLDUP

Thought He Had a Live One and Nearly Faints When He Learns the Truth.

Jimmy Brown, 64 in crime but young in years, will take his medicine when he comes up for punishment on the charge of highway robbery, for as the jury told the staff at the Manhattan to-day, they "got him right."

Henry Spitz, an elderly merchant, whose home is at No. 230 Washington avenue, went to the Drydock Bank at Third street and the Bowery, to withdraw \$15 from his account. He put the two bills he received from the paying teller between the leaves of his bank book, tucked the book in an inside pocket of his waistcoat and started down the Bowery to the station of the elevated at Houston street.

Brown, who was the "father" of a gang of thieves who make the Drydock Bank their working territory, followed Spitz. As the latter was ascending the "L" stairs at Houston street Brown made a dive for the pocket, snatched the bank book and dashed down stairs. Brown walked swiftly up the Bowery and turned into Bleeker street with the man who had been robbed for behind him. A keen-eyed boy who had heard the aged merchant's cries spotted Brown and told Policeman Isaac Kahn that he thought the man was a thief making a get-away. Kahn stopped him. "Hand it over—quick," said the policeman.

"I guess you got me right, bo," was Brown's smiling rejoinder, and he handed over the bank book with the bills between the leaves. How much is it? I didn't get a chance to count it.

"You tell for a measly fifteen snooks," said the cop and the prisoner groaned. "Only see, they started me on to a wrong sucker, by the way. 'Til take my pea of gully all right."

LA Headquarters they discovered that Jimmy Brown of No. 33 Third avenue has as many aliases as the years of his life, which are twenty-seven, and that he is No. 128 in the rogues' gallery. Grand larceny, burglary and other assorted crimes have kept Jimmy in the pen during many years of his life.

BRIDGE GIRDER FALLS; FOUR WORKMEN INJURED. Riveters Manage to Keep From Being Hurl'd to Death in Street.

A nine-ton steel girder, released by the parting of a derrick rope, fell from a supporting tower in course of erection under the Williamsburg end of the Williamsburg Bridge today and in its fall struck a scaffold on which four riveters were at work. The four men managed to save themselves from being dashed to the pavement, but did not escape injury.

Walter Gaines of Asbury Park had his right arm crushed, Warren Conner of No. 43 Forty-third street, Brooklyn; Harry Conner of No. 220 Fifty-third street, Brooklyn, and Robert Dolan of No. 23 Lafayette avenue, Brooklyn, were cut and bruised. It was necessary to lower Gaines to the ground. He was taken to the Eastern District Hospital. The tower on which the men were at work is part of the \$1,000,000 improvement designed to strengthen the Williamsburg Bridge to allow the passage of ten-car "L" trains.
