**Secretly Boards Liner Baltic for Round Trip Sea Voyage to Recover From Collapse Due to Old Bullet Wound in Neck.**

### HITS TAMMANY GRAFTERS IN DICTATED STATEMENT

### Murphy Refuses to Answer, but Fusion Leader Says Gaynor Is "Particeps Criminis"

Mayor Gaynor suddenly sailed at noon to-day for Europe on the Baltic, intending to make a quick round-trip sea voyage of two or three weeks for rest and recuperation. He was accompanied by his son Rufus.

The Mayor is in very poor physical condition. The bullet in his throat, fired when he started for Europe three years ago, is causing him renewed trouble. He is much weakened in strength and nerves.

The "shovel" political campaign will be at a standstill until his return. No selection of other candidates to run with the Mayor will be made until his return.

Before leaving the Mayor issued a vitriolic attack on "Boss" Murphy and other Tammany leaders, accusing them of trying to loot the city treasury.

Mr. Murphy smiled on reading the Mayor's blast and replied: "I have nothing to say." The Tammany campaign was ordered to mark time for a few weeks on account of political danger in beginning too early.

**FUSION COMMITTEE SCORES MAYOR AND TAMMANY.**

The Fusion Committee of one hundred and seven made sharp reply to the Mayor, accusing him of becoming a "particeps criminis" in turning over the city to Tammany by running on a third ticket.

"It was as if he were a man whose vigor and life were a farewell blast at Tammany Hall filled with vitriolic denunciations and charges of attempts to graft and loot the city. He says 'Murphy, McGooey, Donahue and the whole bunch have had four less and whole years.'"

**PLANS ALL DEPEND ON STATE OF HIS HEALTH.**

His sudden departure of the Mayor has thrown the municipal political situation again into complete confusion and uncertainty. The selection of running mates for the Mayor on his independent ticket will be postponed until his return. His campaign managers will endeavor to keep alive his candidacy, but the shovel campaign will dig little political dirt until the personal digger returns.

The next ship leaving Liverpool after the arrival of the Baltic is the Laurentic, on Saturday, the 13th. She is bound for Montreal, due to arrive there on Sept. 20. It is considered probable that the Mayor will choose this route, bringing him back to New York on Sept. 21, DAUGHTER AND OFFICIALS ON SHIP SEE HIM OFF.

He formed this plan several days ago as a substitute for the announced vacation in the Adirondacks. Dock Commissioner R. A. Smith was advised so that he could make all the arrangements for an emergency at the pier to see the Mayor off there only his daughter, Miss Marian Gaynor, Mr. Smith, James Creelman and Ralph Isham.

**GARDEN CITY GOLF LINKS, L. I., N. Y., Sept. 4.**—Jerome D. ## THAW LOSES APPEAL FOR RIGHTS AS TOURIST. SANITY IS UNDER TEST

Deportation Officials Deny Protection Given to Jack Johnson, and Autos Wait Outside Inquiry Room for Race to Frontier.

### COURT DENIES LAST PLEA TO RESTRAIN EVICTION

Judge Hutchinson Declines to Interfere, and Fugitive Is Under Control of Immigration Men

(Special from a Staff Correspondent of The Evening World.)

COATICOOK, Quebec, Sept. 4.—The only question left to be decided by the Board of Inquiry of the Dominion Immigration Department late this afternoon in its hearing looking toward the deportation of Harry K. Thaw was whether the slayer of Stanford White is sane or insane. If adjudged insane he would be immediately ordered out of the country.

The contention raised by Thaw's counsel that he was a tourist travelling through Canada en route to Detroit, Mich., was over-ruled by the Board this afternoon. The officials decided that Thaw was not travelling through the country as was Jack Johnson, who had reservations made on a trans-Atlantic liner.

This ruling was the second set-back Thaw had suffered to-day. Earlier in the afternoon Justice Hutchinson refused to issue a writ prohibiting the holding of Thaw by the Immigration officials.

As soon as the decision of the Board was announced the Board proceeded the same as it would have done in the case of any immigrant. Thaw was again called to the stand and Chairman Robertson questioned him as to his family record. Mr. Robertson had several volumes containing information as to the Thaw family, and following this he questioned the prisoner closely as to his ancestors. Thaw objected strenuously to this line of examination. For the first time during the day it seemed that he might lose his composure.

During the entire session of the immigration board two Canadian alienists were closely watching Thaw, having been retained by the Department of the Interior.

The immigration board of inquiry began its hearing to-day on the question of deporting Harry Thaw, with every prospect of a quick decision. Outside the railroad station where the board sat in its quarters a dozen automobiles were drawn up. Among them were Special Deputy Attorney-General Jerome's car and the seven-seater car of Capt. John Lanyon, his detective assistant, in which it was intended to rush Thaw to the frontier. Then there were more cars, piled with newspaper men and photographers.

Thaw was questioned by Chief Examiner Blake Robertson, who inquired first into his entrance into Canada. Thaw declared to drive them to the home of Peabody's "Lime House." He followed Johnstone on the stand.

THAW TELLS "PUBLIC" HE MUST BE SUPPRESSED.

The inquiry was adjourned until 2 o'clock. A crowd had gathered on the station platform, and as Col. Peabody and Charles D. White, Thaw's lawyer, came down from the detention room where the hearing was held the crowd yelled "Let Thaw out—let him out." They stood gazing at the windows in the hope of seeing Thaw, but he did not appear.

When the adjournment was taken Thaw issued this statement:

Being informed that one intention behind this illegal pursuit is to deprive me of my citizenship, I am now pleading in a small out of court matter that if put on trial in any court outside New York State we might uncover those named who were convicted in 1877, we are prepared to state that we have no intention of ever uncovering these names since were left in blank.
