ORDERS C. R. T. TO PUT GUARDS ON CAR WHEELS

Commission Insists Upon Safety Devices Opposed by Transit Company.

The Public Service Commission to-day served on the Brooklyn Heights Railway Company and other surface car companies of the C. R. T. system requiring them to equip their cars with wheel guards and fenders. This action was taken as the result of an opinion rendered by Commissioner Milo R. Malloy, who conducted the hearings.

Commissioner Malloy traces the progress of the proceedings involving the Brooklyn Rapid Transit company from their beginning in January, 1909, up to the present time. It was shown that the companies were ordered to equip all passenger cars operated in all districts with wheel guards, cars operating within and without congested districts with both wheel guards and projecting fenders, with the provision that the projecting fenders might be folded

up during passage through congested districts, and cars operated wholly in suburban areas with projecting fenders as well as wheel guards.

The order specified that the types of both fenders and wheel guards to be used should be approved by the commission. This order was to take effect July 1, 1913. Through an extension of time was given until Nov. 1, 1913, to conduct tests of wheel guards.

"The record shows," says the opinion, "the long delay and determined resistance which the commission has encountered in its efforts to compel the installation of adequate safety devices and appliances. . . . From the first the requirement that wheel guards be installed was resisted by the Brooklyn companies."
