LAST EDITION. CLUBBERS SUMMONED. Policemen Convicted of Brutality to Citizens Appear Before Lexow.

NINETY STILL ON THE FORGE. Only Four Officers Have Been Broken on Such Charges in Three Years.

BLUECOATS AS LAWBREAKERS. Mr. Goff Says He Will Show that They Are Granted Immunity from Punishment.

Chief Counsel Goff, of the Lexow Committee, had prepared a novel sensation for the second day of his Fall campaign in the investigation of the Police Department.

Mr. Goff read the minutes of the meeting of the board at which the charges were acted upon after the trial. There were nine specifications, and Commissioner Voevodsky moved for conviction of seven of them.

Others Tried, but Not Acquitted. There were two other Captains against whom serious charges had been brought, said Mr. Goff, and they had been tried before the board.

Now Comes Appo's Case. When Mr. Goff called Appo, the policeman who had been charged with the assault on the street, he was called to the stand.

Appo Wished He Was Dead. "He didn't say anything there, but asked for a paper. I gave him one."

Major Klipp, the Chief Clerk of the Police Board, and Commissioner Voevodsky were on the stand with several papers filled with documents from Headquarters, principally clubbing charges.

Goff Looked Flurried. It was 11:15 when Mr. Goff came in looking rather flurried. He had a consultation with Mr. Goff, who got up and called out to the man from the Register.

Fined for Clubbing. "Yes, I think I was convicted twice," Mr. Goff told the witness.

Police Exempt from the Law. "These men," said Mr. Goff, "can commit felonies and misdemeanors, and have been punished for years, and have gone unpunished for years."

MARTIN HITS BACK. He Denies the Statements of Ex-Supt. of Police Murray. Says There Was No Dispute About the Anti-Spy Resolution.

The announcement that ex-Superintendent of Police Murray had come to the support of Supt. Byrnes in the latter's controversy with the Police Board, caused a great deal of discussion in the big white building in Mulberry street to-day.

Mr. Murray refused to discuss ex-Supt. Murray's statements, or to make any explanation whatever. When President Martin arrived at Police Headquarters he dictated the following:
