

TWO BREAK AWAY BUT THEY'RE NIPPED

Detective Reasoning by Deduction Captures Pal of Alleged Pickpocket.

Benjamin Steingesser of No. 150 Ridge Street and Morris Welner of No. 10 Cannon Street were present to-day at the line-up in Detective Headquarters in spite of their disjunctation to be three. Detective Stanley of the pickpocket squad seized them at a crowd watching a fire in Second Street yesterday afternoon. They broke away and vanished after musing Stanley's clothes and dislodging one of his thumbs, which had been engaged in Welner's collar. At night Stanley caught Steingesser in Houston Street and locked him up.

The detective guessed that Welner would go to the Night Court to bail out Steingesser, so that he could avoid the unpleasant publicity of the lineup. Stanley guessed right. Welner drove up with a horseman, and seeing Stanley waiting, took it on the run. Stanley made him stop by threatening to shoot. Hence both met the detective force at the morning lineup before going to Essex Market Court.

SPARKS ARE BLAMED FOR B. R. T. FIRES

Two fires were discovered ten minutes apart early to-day on B. R. T. elevated structures, but the police and company officials said there was nothing suspicious about their origin.

At 1:40 A. M. Policeman Dan O'Leary of the Vernon Avenue Station saw flames on the structure at the Washington Avenue corner of the Fulton Street line. Firemen made quick work of the flames, which slightly burned one tie.

At 1:50 A. M. Policeman Harry Nelson of the Grand Avenue Station saw flames on the structure in Broadway near Summer Avenue. He took an extinguisher from the Fulton Avenue station and put out the blaze without calling the firemen. In both cases an electric spark from a train apparently ignited oil on the ties.

Methodist Official Wants U. S. Anti-Gambling Laws.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—Daseball will go the way of horse racing and all sports will come under suspicion if gambling is not suppressed, the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals of the Methodist Episcopal Church has declared. Its General Secretary, Clarence Truss Wilson, is starting a fight for enactment of legislation by Congress that will stop all interstate transmission of gambling information.

THUGS BAR DOORS, THEN BEAT VICTIM

One Suspect Captured After Knocking \$1,000 Out of Merchant's Pocket.

After lashing bars across the doors of adjoining apartments to prevent tenants rushing out to the rescue, two thugs early to-day called William Tsoums, owner of a chain of Greek fruit stands, to the door of his apartment on the third floor of No. 204 West 20th Street. He was suspicious, but opened the door when told that one of his stands was burning. The men beat him and a wallet containing \$1,000 dropped from his clothes.

An upper floor tenant's cries brought Detectives Anderson and Clark. They seized one man, while the other escaped over the roof. The prisoner, John Kalls of No. 204 West 20th Street, was arraigned in Jefferson Market Police Court, charged with attempted robbery and felonious assault.

FOOTBALL VICTIM BETTER.

Samuel Fletcher, Hurt in N. Y. U. Game, Has No Fracture of Spine.

Samuel Fletcher Jr., the seventeen-year-old New York University footballer, freshman team, who was injured in the game yesterday with Webb Academy, was reported to-day at Fordham Hospital to be recovering. Early fears that there was a fracture of the spine proved baseless, though there may be a fracture of the shoulder.

The boy, as he was carried off the field, asked that the accident be kept from the knowledge of his mother, who is ill. His home is at Rockville Centre, L. I.

THIEVES BUSY NEAR ENRIGHT'S OFFICE

Get \$150 in Cash, \$500 in Liberty Bonds and \$3,000 Worth of Hats.

Burglars invaded the hat factory of Isaac Holoschutz, No. 205 Centre Street, just a stone's throw from Police Commissioner Enright's office at Police Headquarters, and carried away three \$50 bills and \$500 in Liberty bonds taken from the safe and \$3,000 worth of hats. The robbery occurred Tuesday night, but owing to the police cus-

tom of secrecy, the information did not become public until to-day.

Hats valued at several hundred dollars, which the burglars left behind, were chopped with knives, according to Holoschutz. He believes this was done for revenge because the thieves found no little in the safe. Holoschutz had \$15,000 in cash and securities in the safe several days before, but in spite of the Mayor's precautions on Commissioner Enright's efficiency, took them to a safe deposit vault.
