BRISK SKIRMISHING ON ULSTER FRONT BY SCOUT PARTIES

Sniping and Occasional Burst of Machine Gunfire Shows Rival Forces Ready.

MANY HOMES IN FLAMES.

Signs of War Everywhere on Both Sides of Border as Patrols Move Up.

LONDON, March 21 (United Press).—While there has not yet been a general conflict along the "Ulster front," last night was marked by brisk skirmishing, which showed that both forces are ready to begin fighting.

Patrols crept into "enemy territory" in much the same fashion as scouting parties used to crawl into the enemy's trenches in the World War.

Bombs were thrown at scattered points. Bridges were blown up. Motor cars were seized. Trenches were dug across roads to act as traps for automobiles.

With the coming of daylight, the scouts withdrew to their own sides of the line and in the early hours detachments of Ulster volunteers moved up to the front.

Wherever the opposing forces were within rifle shot of each other, there was sniping, and occasionally a burst of machine gun fire was heard.

Approaching the front from either north or south, there were signs of war—artillery who demanded passes, small parties of refugees leaving their homes, bodies of armed men marching briskly.

Telegraph lines were severed to-day in Tyrone, Armagh and Londonderry Counties.

BELFAST, March 21 (Associated Press).—The situation along the Ulster-Free State border is still tense. Firing was renewed at 6 o'clock this morning from the Free State side of the frontier between Aughnacloy and Caledon. The firing, which was from commandeered houses, lasted two hours.

Raiders last evening surrounded Gleanan Lodge, the home of John H. Allinham, near Trillick, County Tyrone, close to the Free State border. Allinham opened fire on the raiders and drove them off.

Encountering Samuel Laird, a worker on the Allinham farm, who also was an Ulster "F" special constable, the raiders killed him.

The burning of isolated Unionist houses was subsequently begun.

The house of John Stewart in the Droemore district was visited by raiders and Stewart, who is seventy years old and lives with his wife and two sons, the latter members of the "B" Special Constabulary, was seriously wounded defending his home.

The raiders set fire to the house and the farm buildings on fire.

Many other houses in the same vicinity, some of the most substantial farmhouses of the countryside, were set on fire and destroyed.

In Trillick, the situation became serious. Even the lights sent up from the police barracks attracted the attention of a mobile patrol from Droemore, which hurried to the town. Terrorism was so widespread and the number of men engaged in attacks against loyalist homes was so large that the crown forces were unable to check the incendiary activities. NO U. S. CALL ON BRITAIN FOR WAR DEBT PAYMENT

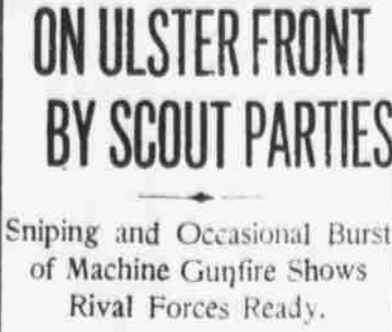
Chancellor Horne Does Not Propose to Make Conditions.

WHARTON DENIES SON WAS ENGAGED TO SUICIDE MODEL



PHILADELPHIA, March 21 (United Press).—Denial that his son, Bayard, was engaged to Pauline Virginia Clark, the Boston artist's model and divorcee who committed suicide at her apartment Thursday night, was made by Henry Wharton to-day.

Henry Wharton, Boston, quoted Miss Ota M. Cossick, of Worcester, as having stated the engagement was announced just twenty minutes before the model swallowed the poison which ended her life.

"It is not true," said the father, "and I am sorry in manufacturing the stories which some 'rotter' has sold to a newspaper."

"My son has made no statement to any person concerning this case, except the proper statement he made to the police after Miss Clark's death."

"He never said he was engaged to marry her and last Saturday morning when I talked to him over the telephone, he set everything right."

BOSTON, March 21.—District Attorney Thayer and Medical Examiner McGrath will confer to-day in connection with the Clark tragedy and, if the facts warrant, will conduct an investigation.

At her home in Worcester, Miss Ota M. Cossick, the only other girl present at the party which ended so tragically, said that Miss Clark announced informally "Bayard and I are to be married on Saturday."

"The announcement was somewhat of a surprise," she said. "Wharton smiled as if somewhat embarrassed, but offered no comment whatever. Nothing was said as to any possible objections on the part of Wharton's people against his marrying Pauline."

"I think she had planned to tell us all at the party and that we were to celebrate. I do not think it was planned as a suicide party. Everybody seemed happy and all congratulated Wharton and Pauline."

After an interview with Probate Judge Sander, the butler, on the stand, will tell the following story:

He was a great favorite at the exclusive Rolling Rock Club, membership in which is confined to twelve Pittsburgh families.

Miss X, daughter of a wealthy family, fell in love with him and he with her, he says. They became secretly engaged, much to the chagrin of a young Mr. Y, a society lad who had been so far as to produce a revolver and lay it on his breakfast table when Archie was serving that meal.

On Washington's Birthday last, according to Archie's story, Mrs. Z—no relation to Miss X but a matron of one of Pittsburgh's most prominent families—called the butler aside and said:

"Archie, I understand you are in love. Who is the girl?"

"It is Miss X," he says he confessed. "We have plighted our true love to each other."

"You poor boy, you'd best go home to your mother in Switzerland and forget this," the matron replied, according to Archie's story to his counsel. Then the next morning (so he says in his sworn application for a habeas corpus writ) he was forced out of the club at pistol point, brought to New York, confined in a West 137th Street apartment three days, escaped, was recaptured in Trenton and has been in the observation ward on Ellis Island ever since.

Club officials in Pittsburgh denied the kidnapping story, although they admitted he was taken away from Rolling Rock "under escort." They said one of his queer actions was to wander about the club's preserves attired only in his underclothing. Again, they say, he was fond of claiming to have "royal blood" and of declaring himself the equal or superior of a certain other Swiss whose engagement to an American millionaire became known.

JURY PICKED TO TRY TEX RICKARD; NEW FOREMAN CHOSEN

PHILADELPHIA, March 21 (United Press).—A close associate of Mr. Rickard in boxing matters, came into the courtroom just as Mr. Steuer was using his fourteenth challenge in response to a shake of the defendant's head.

Mr. Steuer began to-day to ask talesmen whether they would be prejudiced for or against witnesses who have been for weeks in the close custody of the Gerry Society, which initiated the prosecution of Mr. Rickard.

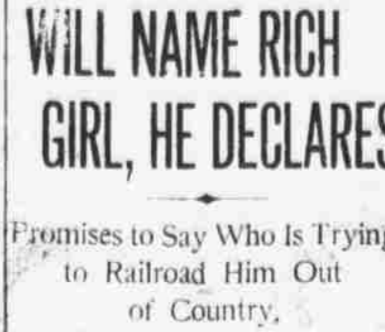
