150 LIVES WERE LOST.

Result of the South's Recent Hurricane—Mrs. Carnegie's Yacht Ashore. Butts, Ga., Oct. 6.—Confirmatory reports are received from the United States that 120 lives were lost, enumerated in part as follows: Twenty, Campbell Island; eight, Butler's Island; five, Doboy; seven, Brunswick. The damage to property in Brunswick, Darien, Doboy and Wolf, Cumberland, St. Simons and Jekyll Islands, inclusive of vessels and other property, is estimated at \$1,000,000.
