OHIO REPUBLICAN BY 60,000. Record of the President's Own State in 1890 Eclipsed This Year. WILMINGTON, N. C., Nov. 9.—Terror is broadcast in this city to-night. Every block of the city is patrolled by armed white men, and the negroes are not allowed upon the streets. About 8 o'clock to-night a street car in the suburbs of the city was fired into by negroes, who were pursued by over 200 armed white men. The negroes managed to escape. A large meeting of white men was held this morning and decisive steps were taken to rid Wilmington of several objectionable characters. Resolutions were unanimously passed notifying Alexander Manley, editor of the negro paper, which gained notoriety by publishing an article slandering the white women of the South, to leave this county within twenty-four hours and to carry with him every bit of his newspaper outfit. Twenty-five citizens were detailed to see that Manley leaves the county and, if necessary, to call upon every white man in the city to help them. Resolutions were also adopted condemning the present Republican-Populist city administration, and suggesting in a menacing manner that the Mayor and Chief of Police at once vacate their offices.

Two Masked Men Enter a Booth at Butte, Mont., When Votes Were Being Counted. HELENA, Mont., Nov. 9.—A thrilling climax to the Butte election occurred in that city at President's Club, at about 5 o'clock this morning. Jack Daly, a clerk of election, was shot in the abdomen, and Dennis O'Leary, a special deputy sheriff, was wounded in the right shoulder by two masked men, who entered the booth while the judges were counting the ballots, supposedly for the purpose of robbery. Both of the masked men escaped. Only one of the masked men was seen by the sheriff. O'Leary was taken to the Sisters' Hospital. Daly died before he reached the hospital.
