

ARNSTEIN SEEN BY LAWYER, WHO HAS TO TESTIFY

Accused Leader of \$5,000,000 Bond Theft Plot Is in Cleveland.

NO PROMISE OF GIVING UP

Miss Brice Questioned—Cafe Men Subpoenaed—Alleged "Squarer" Held.

Developments in the \$5,000,000 bond plot mystery came thick and fast yesterday.

Eugene F. McGee, an attorney of 149 Broadway, testified when ordered to do so by Federal Judge A. N. Hand that he had conferred with "Nicky" Arnstein, alleged "master mind" of the plot, as recently as last Tuesday in the Hotel Winton in Cleveland.

It was learned that another man whose connection with the bond theft plot is said to have been almost as important as that of Arnstein is also being sought far and wide by detectives.

Fannie Brice, actress wife of Arnstein, was questioned for two hours before Special United States Commissioner Alexander Gilchrist, Jr. She rejected much humor into the proceedings, but gave little information that can be of value to Edwards H. Childs, receiver for her husband, who is trying to locate his assets.

"Three Little Boys" Visit Actress.

She testified that she had lost the key to her safe deposit vault several months ago and had not looked at the vault since. These are among the vaults in which the receiver has asked the court's permission to look for stolen securities. The actress told a strange tale of a visit paid to her at the New Amsterdam Theatre Roof, where she is performing, by "three little boys" who were dressed as messengers.

She said they sent word that they wanted to see her about a "key to a safe deposit vault." She did not go into details about the visit.

Names of Charles Gonder, wire-tapper; a Cleveland gambler; Charles "Cheats" Giesberg, and other characters of notorious reputation were mentioned mysteriously in connection with the case.

Several Broadway cafe men received subpoenas ordering them to appear before Commissioner Gilchrist, and it is understood they will be questioned about large sums of money that have expended in the purchase of liquor stocks within the last two months and about persons he has entertained at their establishments.

Robert Bradley, a twenty-three-year-old messenger, was arrested by Detectives Gillilan and Merino of the Old Slip police station, charged with having stolen \$3,500 worth of Liberty bonds from the office of Honorable Henry L. Derby & Co. of 69 Wall street.

In a confession allowed to have been made in Police Headquarters he accused Tony Candelora of 208 West 125th street with having led him astray, charging that Candelora had told him that he had "squared things" for Bennie Binkowitz, a divorcee of \$178,000 worth of stolen bonds, and that Binkowitz had been murdered because he tried to cheat his associates out of their share.

To avoid a repetition of the gigantic plot, R. E. Brown, first vice-president of the American Surety Company, made the suggestion yesterday that some sort of clearing house system be developed for handling securities, so that the danger from dishonest messengers might be minimized.

Tells of Meeting Arnstein.

Mr. McGee's testimony of his recent meeting with Arnstein was given most unwillingly and came in the conclusion of the hearing in the bankruptcy proceedings brought against the missing man. Saul S. Myers, attorney for the National Surety Company, which is pushing the proceedings against Arnstein for the purpose of recovering money it has lost through having been compelled to make good on the bonds of fleeing messengers, sprung a surprise upon him by calling him as a witness.

In the presence of Commissioner Gilchrist Mr. McGee refused to answer questions appertaining to his client on the ground of privilege. He was taken before Judge Hand, who permitted his counsel and directed him to reply.

When asked by Mr. Myers when he had been retained as attorney for Arnstein, whom he claims to represent, he stated that Arnstein had telephoned his law partner, William J. Fallon, at the latter's home in Mamaroneck, L. I., last Saturday, Sunday or Monday. The call was made over the long distance wires.

Mr. Fallon has been engaged in the Fritz murder trial in the Bronx, so he sent Mr. McGee to Cleveland, where Arnstein said he might be found. Mr. McGee testified he left this city Monday night and returned on Wednesday, when he went direct to the Hotel Commodore to see Fannie Brice and tell her that her husband had retained his firm to represent him.

"Did you believe Arnstein back to this city with you?" Mr. Myers asked, and Mr. McGee replied that he did not.

"Where did you leave him?" he asked.

"At the Hotel Winton," he replied.

Arnstein's Lawyer Surprised.

Mr. Myers then caused a puzzled expression to fit across Mr. McGee's face by asking "Did you meet him in room 304 of the Winton?"

Mr. McGee answered that he had met Arnstein in the lobby and that they had talked for about two hours. He denied that Arnstein had given him any money, papers or documents, and said that as far as his own knowledge went no one connected with his office had heard from Arnstein since.

He denied that he was retained as attorney for Fannie Brice, and said that

on the occasion of his conference with her on Wednesday the actress requested him not to tell her of her husband's whereabouts. He said he had made no arrangement to obtain bail for Arnstein, nor had he made any definite offer to deliver him to the District Attorney should the latter agree to accept a \$50,000 bond.

A great number of men whose connection with the case was not explained were mentioned to Miss Brice, and she was asked if she knew any of them. Their names as given by Mr. Myers were Maurice Decker, Robert Cohen, Charles Gonder, Arnold Rothstein, Louis Bluet, Fred Jackson, Philip Kautel, Ed Strong, Charles Drucker and a man known as Sam Groux. She also was asked if she knew David Sullivan, the broker under indictment charged with having received stolen bonds, or if she had ever met Joseph Gluck, one of the messengers awaiting trial in the Tombs. She replied that she knew neither of them.

Throughout the hearing the actress kept herself huddled in a large milk can which she wore a tan colored tunic with a small violet sash examination will be continued on Monday.

During this preceding Laddo Wasser-vogel, an attorney, was asking Judge Otto A. Rosenthal of General Sessions, to reduce the bail of "Big Eddie" Furey, central figure of the group already under arrest for bond thefts. He said that Furey cannot possibly raise \$100,000. Decision was deferred.

Representatives of the New York Stock Exchange conferred with Assistant District Attorneys Dooling, Unger and Talley in regard to the case. Mr. Talley waited until he had made certain satisfactory arrangements before he produced him.

Two Held in Bonds of \$2,500.

Robert Bradley, the messenger charged with thefts from Derby & Co., and Candelora, whom he accuses as an accomplice, were arraigned before Magistrate March in the Tombs Court and held in \$2,500 bonds.

According to the police Bradley charges that Candelora approached him on Broadway in December and induced him to join an automobile party. After the party was over he was told that Candelora told him it would be an easy matter to "hold out" some bonds.

After several minor thefts, according to the police, the messenger asserted, Bradley waited until he had made certain satisfactory arrangements before he produced him.

On a subsequent trip to Waterbury Candelora is alleged to have become enraged because the messenger's piteous wails were not large enough and to have beaten him. Fearing detection the young man fled to Detroit. A girl friend was used to decoy him back to this city and his arrest followed.

Fannie Brice treated her examination much as if it were a "turn on the variety stage." She lost no opportunity to enliven the proceedings with impromptu remarks, and at one juncture turned to the newspaper reporter and said: "Say, you fellows are grabbing off a pretty good monologue. I think I'll use it myself."

She testified that she kept two accounts, the United States Mortgage and Trust Company under the names of Fannie Brice and Fannie Arnold. She also had a small account, she testified, with the Colonial Bank.

"\$13,000 Came From Gambling."

Asked about the checks aggregating \$13,000 that she tried to cash several days after her husband's disappearance, she explained that she had cashed them with her Feb. 12, but had told her that he would not have sufficient funds for her to cash them until a week later. This money, she said, was derived from the sale of bonds and not from bond thefts, as Joseph Gluck has stated. She had turned over the returned drafts, she said.

When Mr. Myers held a whispered conversation with Mr. Childs, the receiver, she remarked, "I suppose now you're cooking up something big." When he asked to see her check books, she turned to a representative of the firm of Grossman & Vorhaus, who was appearing for her, and said: "Give Mr. Myers the check book; he likes to play with them."

When questioned about her financial transactions began to annoy her Miss Brice shouted: "Say, there are only two things I can remember, telephone numbers and the royalties on my songs. I've got such a great memory, would you believe it? I paid bills of two gas companies for three months for the same service and didn't know it."

The actress said that Arnstein had conducted a "short hospital" on Broadway at the time that he had sold second hand automobiles "after they had been doped up."

Asked if she was willing to let the receiver open her safe deposit boxes she asked "Is she a life I am?" She said that she had no property in her vault in the Lincoln Trust Company except a vanity box, a cigarette case and gold jewelry, but added that this was one of the boxes to which she had lost the key.

of Nations covenant of the President approved. But, as usual, the Tammany outfit and their pals had their way.
