

JOHNSON LEADS FOR PRESIDENT IN CALIFORNIA

Polls 80 Per Cent. of First Choices; Wood Strong in Second Place.

NATIONS LEAGUE ISSUE Primary Ticket Carries Names of Progressives and Old Guard About Equally Divided.

CALIFORNIA.

The poll of THE SUN AND NEW YORK HERALD, taken through the county chairmen, substantiates the prevailing impression that United States Senator Hiram W. Johnson of California is the first choice of the Republicans of that State for President.

California has a preferential primary on May 4, when twenty-six delegates and an equal number of alternates to the national convention will be chosen.

It seems practically certain that the ticket already in the field for Johnson will be elected. Up to date there are no candidates for delegates in opposition, although there is a movement on foot among a group of Republicans to organize a ticket for Herbert Hoover, another son of California.

The poll indicates that Major-General Leonard Wood is second choice of the Republicans of California. It had been understood that he would make no contest for delegates against Senator Johnson in the primaries. In line with the recently announced change in policy of going into all States with preferential primaries a Wood ticket of delegates may be framed up.

The League of Nations is the large that is uppermost in the minds of California Republicans, as indicated in the poll, with specific mention of Americanism as a natural accompaniment. The chairman declared the party would not support any ticket that would not include the League of Nations.

Johnson in Lead, Wood Second. Senator Johnson polled 86 per cent. of the first choices received by THE SUN AND NEW YORK HERALD. General Wood got only one-sixth as many first choices as Johnson, but he was strong on second choice.

Gov. Frank O. Lowden of Illinois and William Howard Taft were the only others mentioned in the first choice column, each receiving the same number as Wood. But Taft got no second choices and Lowden only an insignificant number.

Gov. Calvin Coolidge, Senator William E. Borah of Idaho, Gen. John J. Pershing and Herbert Hoover all received mention in the second choice column. According to the Republican county chairmen the Democrats are so much "at sea" that they are not thinking much of candidates. Bryan, Wilson, Hoover and McAdoo were all spoken of as being thought of most casually.

A Separate Poll Taken. One county chairman, in order to check up his independent judgment as to the feeling in his territory, took a little poll of his own.

"I have asked thirty-three Republicans as I changed to meet them during the past two or three days," he reports, "for their Presidential preference, and the result is set out in the enclosed sheets and is somewhat of a surprise to myself."

"Of these thirty-three, five had until this year been very prominently identified with the Democratic party, but they are done with it forever, and there are a large number of others who formerly affiliated with the Democratic party here who will leave them during this campaign. Registration of party voters where they declare their party preference, shows a very heavy increase of Republican registration, and if the present rate holds out until election, it closes the State will register about one-third Republicans."

One County Indorses Taft. One of the county chairmen, who has marked the name of Taft as first choice, added this explanation:

"The cross represents the sentiment of the executive committee of our county committee in formal indorsement has been made. Our committee is not very enthusiastic at present owing to the persistence of Hiram Johnson in forcing himself on the county, as we consider that we were disfranchised by him in the last Presidential election."

"Should the Senate permit the adoption of the so-called peace treaty without the League reservations," remarked one chairman, "or such other ones as will fully protect the independence of the United States, then no issue, however

pertinent, will give the party from the defeat it will so rightly merit.

"If the treaty is adopted with such reservations as will safeguard our sovereignty and independence, such action will give forth an overwhelming vote of confidence in the Republican party on any reasonable issue for progress advanced by it."

Other Issues Mentioned. Issues which were mentioned in the returns in reply to the question as to what would be the "paramount issue" were governmental house cleaning and a change from extravagance to business methods, reconstruction and the high cost of living. The tariff got one vote and one man thought that "two or dry" would be an issue. "Whether this nation shall continue a republic or autocracy shall continue to increase" was the answer in one of the blanks.

The Johnson primary ticket was announced in California on Monday, carrying the names of ultra progressives and members of the "Old Guard" about equally divided. Newspapers of both stripes are behind him and there is no question of where the State organization stands.

In the latter part of February Los Angeles Republicans voted to circulate petitions to place in nomination a ticket pledged for Hoover for the Republican nomination. When they appeared to the northern California reply was: "What does Hoover talk about? He will put up money only if Hoover declares specifically that the movement is not unwelcome." Answers to dispatches sent to Hoover have not been made, but it was significant that a meeting to launch the Hoover movement was called off. No explanation was given.

Democratic friends of Hoover have announced through Sidney M. Van Wyck, chairman of the Democratic State Executive Committee, that they will put a ticket for delegates for Hoover in the field without consulting him.

No other candidate has raised a whisper about entering the Democratic primaries in California up to date.

EDWARDS FILES FOR ILLINOIS PRIMARIES

New Jersey Governor's Petition May Be the Only Democratic One There.

30,000 NAMES CLAIMED

Cook County Committee Not Seeking Signatures for Palmer or McAdoo.

Special to THE SUN AND NEW YORK HERALD. Chicago, March 3.—Gov. Edward I. Edwards of New Jersey is now before the Democratic voters of Illinois as a candidate for President. Petitions to have his name placed on the Presidential preference ballots that will be voted April 13 were filed with the Secretary of State today at Springfield. About 30,000 names were signed to the petitions, only 4,500 names were filed. The law limits the number of signatures to 5,000.

Gov. Edwards' Presidential primary petition will be the only Democratic petition presented. This was the word which came from headquarters of the Cook County Democratic Managing Committee, John Quinn, secretary of the committee, declared he had made arrangements for getting signatures to either a Palmer or McAdoo petition.

Leaders of the "regular" Democratic organization are waiting word from Roger C. Sullivan as to whether a rival petition for Attorney-General Palmer or William McAdoo is to be filed. Mr. Sullivan is in Washington.
