## MARANVILLE HELPS WRONG BALL TEAM

### Boston Shortstop Devotes Day to Assisting Dodgers to Victory, 4 to 2.

Take it from Walter Maranville, whom they call the Rabbit, those who changed the rules of baseball last February did not do so to annoy the old-timers. The rule changes were made for the purpose of making the game more interesting for the spectators. Maranville issued this pronouncement after he had committed four errors, which stood out in bold relief among the reasons for a Brooklyn victory over Boston by the score of 4 to 2.

The Rabbit's first boom came in the innocuous third, but in the sixth he came to the fore with two more misplays on ground balls and helped the Dodgers gather their fourth counter. It was a rather brilliant performance. Maranville's error in the second inning, which gave the Dodgers a 2-0 lead, was the only one of his errors that was of any consequence. He made three of the errors which were in the parlance of the diamond known as boomerangs, and threw in a wild throw that gave the Dodgers substantial assistance in an outburst which netted them three runs in the second inning, and, as matters turned out, put the game on ice.
