General in Only Campaign Speech in Manhattan Decries Militarism

FOR A REAL DEMOCRACY

Major-Gen. Leonard Wood made his one and only pre-convention campaign speech in New York city yesterday.

The talk was before 500 persons at noon in the rooms of the Leonard Wood Club, 120 West Twenty-third street.

The cost of living is going up, he declared, touching on a topic that proved of greatest interest to his audience.

"The people are keenly interested in finding who is keeping us out of sugar, potatoes and other necessities of life.

"I am strongly opposed to militarism," the general added, "but what we do need is a good efficient army of 200,000.

WOOD LED JOHNSON BY 5,729 IN INDIANA

McCray Lands Republican Nomination for Governor.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 7.—Revised complete but unofficial returns from every precinct in the State in the primary last Tuesday, tabulated here this afternoon, show Major-Gen. Wood ran 5,729 votes ahead of Senator Johnson in the Republican Presidential preference contest.

For the Republican nomination for Governor complete figures show Warren T. McCray had a majority of 4,952, the vote being: McCray, 109,627; Fester, 63,478; Toner, 41,187.

While Dr. McCulloch had a commanding lead in the Democratic gubernatorial nomination race, it was not a majority.
