

MEMORIAL DAY TO BE HONORED ABROAD

Many Prominent French Families Will Be Represented at Ceremony.

MASS TO BE CELEBRATED

Father William Hemmick of Washington, D. C., Is Selected as Celebrant.

PARIS, May 29.—Many of the most prominent families of France will be represented at the Memorial Day mass to be celebrated to-morrow morning at the Church of St. Joseph, Cardinal Amette, Archbishop of Paris, is in Rome, but has instructed his Vicar-General, Mgr. Odell, to represent him at the ceremony. Father William Hemmick of Washington, D. C., in Europe on special mission, will be the celebrant. Among the French women who will be present will be Duchesse Noailles, a descendant of Marquis de Lafayette. Father Joseph N. Trainor of Cleveland, Ohio, United States Army chaplain, has returned to France from Rome for Memorial Day. During the war he was especially attached to the Nineteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-first machine gun battalions of the Seventh Division, and will be the chief participant in services to be held in the cemetery at Thiaucourt, where more than 1,200 men of his division are buried. Pope Benedict XV. will devote a part of to-day in prayer for American soldiers who died on the battlefields of France and Germany, according to a cable message from Edward L. Hearn, European commissioner of the Knights of Columbus.

SERVICES WILL BE HELD IN ENGLAND

Graves of American Dead in British Isles Decorated.

LONDON, May 29.—Decorations Day will be observed here by a memorial service at St. Margaret's Chapel, Westminster, the official church of the House of Commons, and the placing of an American flag and a wreath on each of the 2,500 graves of American soldiers, sailors and marines buried in the British Isles. The graves are scattered over 105 cemeteries in ninety-nine towns, reaching from the bleak shores of Iceland, where the Tuscania and Otranto victims lay, to the sunny shores of Devonshire, where are buried those who succumbed to influenza on transport. The initiative in decorating the graves this year was taken by the London Post of the American Legion. Although the Legion was assisted by a committee of Americans, headed by Ambassador John W. Davis and Consul-General Robert P. Skinner, the task has been a formidable one for its seventy members. MEMORIAL DAY SCHEDULE VARIED

Parades, Concerts, Church Services and Visits to Hospitals Planned.

MEMORIAL MASS FOR SOLDIER DEAD

United Spanish War Veterans to Hold Services.

The annual memorial military mass for the American soldier and sailor dead, under the auspices of Gloucester Camp, No. 5, United Spanish War Veterans, for many years celebrated on the grounds of the United States Naval Hospital, in the navy yard, Brooklyn, will not take place there this year. Instead it will be solemnized to-day at the Roman Catholic Church of the Nativity, Classon avenue and Madison street, of which the Rev. Dr. John L. Belford is rector. The mass will take place at 10:30, the celebrant being the Right Rev. Mgr. John P. Chidwick, president of St. Joseph's Seminary, Dunwoodie, and chaplain of the Maine when she was sunk in Havana Harbor. He will be assisted by the Rev. Edward J. Higgins, former army chaplain and now a member of Brooklyn Post 211, American Legion, who will be senior deacon; the Rev. James J. Brady, former naval chaplain, who will be junior deacon, and the Rev. Edward J. Matthes, chaplain of the Long Island Chapter of the Knights of Columbus, who will be master of ceremonies. Father Belford will preach the sermon. The United Spanish War Veterans—a Fourteenth Regiment Camp—will also hold a memorial service in Holy Cross Cemetery. They will honor the memory of the late Mgr. William J. White, former rector of the Roman Catholic Church of the Visitation, Richards and Verona streets, who was a chaplain in the Spanish-American war. Following the memorial mass in Brooklyn Mgr. Chidwick will go to The Mall in Central Park, where he will be the principal speaker at a service under the auspices of the American Legion, the United Spanish War Veterans and the G. A. R.

CONEY'S BEACHES HAVE BIG CROWDS

Summery Day Induces Many to Enter Surf.

Coney Island enjoyed the first real summer day this season yesterday and by mid-afternoon more than 100,000 persons were massed up and down the beaches and along Surf avenue and the Bowery. The bathers were there in large numbers, and in accordance with their promise the police were on the lookout for girls and women who might try to parade up the beach in socks. Following close on the heels of the cops when they left the station house to perform that duty went a dozen prohibition enforcement agents who were on the job to see that soft drinks were soft drinks. The house scouts arrested a bartender and one of the proprietors of Stube Brothers' cafe in Surf avenue, charging that whiskey was sold for fifty cents a drink there. The prisoners were released on bail. A fire in the bungalow colony in West Thirty-sixth street last night attracted several thousand persons and provided excitement. Two structures were burned, entailing a loss of \$3,000.

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United Spanish War Veterans to Hold Services.

The observance of Memorial Day this year will include a generous number of church services, parades, concerts and favors to service men in hospitals. Mayor Hylan and prominent city officials join in the formal parade of veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic, Spanish War Veterans and members of the American Legion and similar organizations who march in Riverside Drive from Seventy-third street to Twenty-second street to-morrow. The parade is scheduled to start at 9 o'clock. Lieut. Gen. Nelson A. Miles, U. S. A., retired, will review the column at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument, Riverside Drive at Eighty-ninth street. Memorial exercises will be held at the same place. The following list is given as a guide to the services to-day: Dr. J. P. McComas will deliver the memorial address at a service of the Sons of the American Revolution, in St. Paul's Chapel, Broadway and Vesey street, at 10:30 A. M. The annual memorial services for the Hebrew Veterans of the Wars of the Republic will be held in Carnegie Hall at 10:30 A. M. Major-Gen. Clarence H. Edwards, commander of the Twenty-sixth division in France; Judge Abraham I. Elkus, Maurice Simmons and Rabbi Stephen S. Wise will speak. Gloucester Camp No. 4, United Spanish War Veterans, will celebrate the nineteenth annual memorial military mass in the Church of the Nativity, Classon avenue and Madison street, Brooklyn, at 10:30 A. M. The Veteran Corps of the Sixty-ninth

Regiment will march from their armory to Old Calvary Cemetery for memorial exercises and the laying of a corner stone of a monument, 2 P. M. Justice Philip J. McCook will present a stand of colors to the Murray Hill Post of the American Legion, at St. Gabriel's Park, Thirty-sixth street and Second avenue, 2 P. M. The United Spanish War Veterans of Manhattan, assisted by members of the Grand Army of the Republic and World War Veterans, will hold a service at the Sheep Meadow, Central Park, at 3:30 P. M. Three trees will be planted, one for each of the organizations participating. Vespers for the dead, in memory of the Orthodox Christians who gave their lives in the late war, will be held by the Holy Eastern Orthodox-Catholic Church at St. Nicholas Cathedral, 15 East Ninety-seventh street, at 5 P. M. The Richmond County Chapter of the American Red Cross will entertain the wounded soldiers at General Hospital No. 41, Fox Hills, Staten Island, with games and a vaudeville performance, in which some of the disabled men may participate.

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DANIELS AND BAKER HONOR DEAD HEROES

Both Issue Customary Memorial Day Addresses.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Memorial Day messages were made public to-night by Secretary Baker and Secretary Daniels, following the custom of the War and Navy departments. "The tributes of flowers which to-day are placed on the graves of our soldiers are the outward emblems of a deep and solemn emotion which fills the entire nation," Mr. Baker said. "We shall have in our minds the virtues of those to whose memory Memorial Day was originally set apart, and we will think with fresh pride and affection of the American soldiers of the world war who in their youth and strength carried America overseas and showed the Old

World the fruits of the institutions which our fathers established and our soldiers in all generations have victoriously defended. The heart of the nation will, too, be filled with sympathy as it tries to share the personal burden of those whose family ties were broken by the sacrifices of the war. "The country that forgets its dead does not deserve a citizenship courageous enough to place their lives in jeopardy to defend it," Secretary Daniels said. "The valor of the youths of our day to the number of four million, who were ready in the world war to die for America, teaches us that the breed of heroes has not played out. There are as many Nathan Hales in every hundred youths to-day as there were in the Revolution. This knowledge gives higher appreciation of the soldiers and sailors in whose honor we celebrate Memorial Day. We think more of their sacrifice, even unto death, than before this generation had experienced what war means. As we honor the dead heroes to-day, let the people of the Republic rededicate themselves to a love of freedom that knows no creed, no race, no climate, nor ocean boundary."

MRS. AUDITORE FILES PROTEST ON WILL

Objects to Mysterious Bequest of \$80,000.

Mrs. Guisippina Auditore of 83 Linden avenue, Brooklyn, widow of Joseph Auditore, filed yesterday in the Surrogate's Court, Brooklyn, notice of objections to the probate of her husband's will. Mrs. Auditore, in contesting the document, says it is not her husband's last will, that its execution was not her husband's free, unrestrained and voluntary act, and that at the time of its execution he was not of sound mind, memory and understanding. The widow demands a jury trial of the issues involved. Auditore died on May 9 of pneumonia at the home of Miss Jennie Lebonky, at 124 West Seventy-second street. He left all of his million-dollar estate with the exception of \$80,000, to his wife and our children.


