

3,000,000 CARRIED BY B. R. T. IN STRIKE Record Holiday Crowds Get to Beaches and Back With Only Usual Delays. CRISIS IS SEEN TO-DAY Union Leaders Say Electricians Must Surrender to Physical Strain.

The Brooklyn Rapid Transit electricians had no permit yesterday for countless thousands of beachgoers at the beaches and at various other places of amusement. Early in the day record crowds began flowing to all of the popular local resorts, leaving the trains at the beach ends barely close the gates, packing themselves into the Sea Beach line of the B. R. T. subway and hanging onto the running boards of all the open surface cars leading away from the heart of the borough. Just how many participated in the evacuation is not definitely known, but officials of the B. R. T. estimate last night that there would be a total of about 3,000,000 fares.

If the prophecy made by the strike leaders earlier in the day had come true these crowds would have found them- selves in a very unpleasant predicament when it came time to return home. Philip Reeves, business agent of the local branch of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, with which electricians are affiliated, had said the men operating the power switches in the various plants of the B. R. T. in place of the strikers were working day and night in a frantic effort to keep the street cars and trolleys from stopping, but officials of the B. R. T. estimate last night that there would be a total of about 3,000,000 fares.

Hahlo resignation split with Craig. Reveals Differences of Comptroller and Chamberlain. The resignation of Deputy Comptroller Louis H. He declined to discuss the exact nature of the breach between himself and Mr. Craig, but it is understood to have been due to the Comptroller's insistence that the deputy accept and interpret the Comptroller's views as to what friends of the department term "an unnecessary humiliation" in that connection.

Outlaw railroad strikers stand pat. It is Declared That 8,000 Are Still Out in East. Outlaw railroad strikers reiterated their intention yesterday of standing pat until their seniority rights in their old jobs are recognized. At a meeting in Fairview Hall, Jersey City, it was declared that 8,000 are still out in the East and have organized the Eastern Railway Men's Association for the purpose of keeping the fight alive. Four thousand of that number, it was said, are working on other lines, but the remainder are still out in the East.

FIREMEN HELD AS SPEEDERS AFTER A THREAT OF DEATH

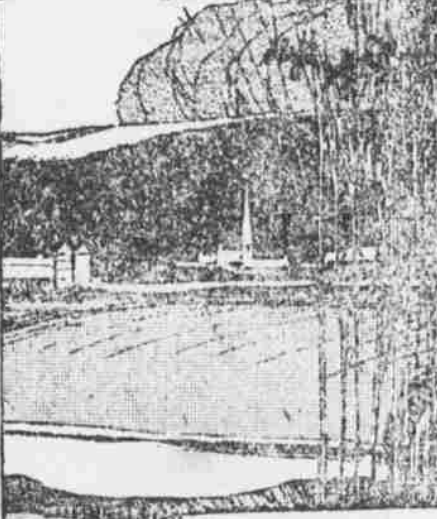
