**YOUTHS GIVE TALE  
OF BOLD BANDITS**

Kidnapped, Bank Messenger  
Says, and Tossed Over  
a Wall.

**BUT HE FINDS PAY ROLL**

Now, With Companion, He Is  
Held Charged With Theft  
of \$2,215.

Aldous Meidenbauer, 18 years old, who gave an address in Putnam avenue, Brooklyn, which the police could not find, a messenger for the Century Doll Company, 62 West Fourteenth street, Manhattan, and Salvatore Filippone, 19 years old, a former employee of the doll company, were arrested last night charged with the theft of \$2,215, the payroll of the concern. Meidenbauer was found near the west wall in Central Park, bound, gagged and with a bottle beside him that smelt of chloroform. His first story was that he had been kidnapped on his way from the New Netherland Bank, 41 West Thirty-fourth street, robbed and carried by taxicab to Central Park, where he was tossed over a wall, unconscious.

Filippone was arrested at his home, 1364 Thirty-eighth street, Brooklyn, after Meidenbauer had been taken into custody, and it is said, had offered to help detectives catch his pal. Both young men, the police asserted, made confessions when they were lodged at the West Thirtieth street station.

Filippone, it is said, handed over the stolen money, which was yet in the bag in which Meidenbauer took it from the bank.

In his alleged confession Meidenbauer said he went to the bank, deposited \$2,200 of the firm's money, and as usual drew the payroll.

The police said he told them he met Filippone at Fifth avenue and Fifty-ninth street, where he had been waiting for the West Seventy-second street park exit, where Meidenbauer submitted to being tied and gagged and to breathing the chloroform bottle Filippone held to his nose. Meidenbauer said he actually became unconscious from breathing too deeply, according to the police, and then declared Filippone, in addition to taking the money, carried off his personal bank book and some valuable papers of the firm, throwing them into the park bushes as he ran.

When Patrolman John Hoyt of the West Sixty-eighth street station rapped Meidenbauer on the head and helped unfasten the ropes Meidenbauer told a story of being seized by a bandit in a black taxicab at Broadway and Thirty-fourth street and struck over the head after the robbery. Meidenbauer had been employed four years as a clerk and messenger and had met with no accidents to former payrolls.

**VALUE 'TOWN TOPICS'  
AT 10 TIMES INCOME**

**Col. Mann's Will Permits  
Executors to Sell at a Price.**

The will of Col. William D. Mann, owner of *Town Topics*, was filed yesterday in the Surrogate's Court. He divided his residuary estate equally between his widow, Sophie Mann of 186 Madison avenue, Morristown, N. J., and their daughter Emma.

To twelve employees of his publication, who have been with the company more than five years, the testator left \$100 each. He gave a dozen nephews \$1,000 each, but to his nephew, Seward W. Mann, he left only \$5, explaining that this nephew had merited his displeasure. To his brother, Horace W. Mann of Deland, Fla., he left an annuity of \$1,600 and to his sister-in-law, Jennie L. Mann of 460 West 149th street, he left an annuity of \$1,200.

Mr. Mann directed that his executors, former Mayor Joseph M. Duvel and John R. Reid, Jr., may sell *Town Topics* if they can obtain a price for it not less than ten times the annual net income. Mr. Duvel is nominated as editorial director of the magazine at \$3,600 a year, if he is willing to accept the place. He is not to be barred from engaging in other work if he elects to accept.

The value of the estate is accorded at "over \$10,000."

**ARRESTS IN THEFT

**Part of \$25,000 Loot Recovered,  
Police Say.**

Joseph Fried, the houseman employed by Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton Fish, at 80 Fifth avenue, who disappeared on the afternoon of April 17, just before Mrs. Fish discovered the loss of \$25,000 in jewelry, was arrested last night in the grounds of the house of the Daughters of Jacob, Clay avenue, The Bronx, where he has been employed for the last two weeks as a general utility man.

Detectives McMahon, Snelly, Smith and Grossman of the East Sixty-seventh street station, made the arrest. Mrs. Fish offered a reward of \$2,500 after the discovery of her loss.

At the station house the detectives say they found some of the stolen jewelry in Fried's possession. He had a diamond bar pin and a pearl breastpin surrounded with diamonds. The rest of the stuff, according to his captors, Fried said he had sold to Samuel Middler for \$600. The police arrested
