PERSHING RELIEVES TENSE SITUATION

Retirement Ends Peril of Open Clash With March, Whom He Outranks. WILSON MAY HOLD HIM General Has Two Years Service Before He May Quit Voluntarily.

Special to THE SUN and NEW YORK HERALD. WASHINGTON, June 8.—Gen. Pershing's decision to retire from active military service as announced in his letter to Secretary of War Baker relieves a rather embarrassing situation in the War Department due to his high permanent rank, given by Congress as a reward for his services as Commander in Chief of the American Expeditionary Forces in France during the war. This situation arose from the fact that in the United States Army the Chief of Staff, at present Gen. March, theoretically is in command, although in the present situation he is outranked by Gen. Pershing.

REDS PLOT REVOLT FROM AMSTERDAM

Bureau Directed by Lenin, With Louis Frayna Representing America.

PARIS, June 7 (delayed).—American Communists were represented in secret conferences held in Amsterdam last February, when international Communists planned a worldwide revolution and for the setting up of Soviets through the agency of trade unions, according to disclosures made by the Paris Matin. A special correspondent of that newspaper asserts that a man named Louis Frayna, alias Ralph Snyder, was the American Communist representative in the conferences and that he and the Dutch Communist delegate, a man named Wynkoop, acting on direct instructions from Nikolai Lenin, played most important parts in trying to link up world labor organizations to save the Russian Soviet.

GERMAN COALITION IN SMALL MAJORITY

Indications Show It Has Barely Escaped Defeat.

BRUSSELS, June 8.—Unofficial reports from districts returning 280 mandates (Reichstag seats) are about equally divided between the present coalition Government and the right and left opposition. It is generally believed that the allotment of the overflow votes to the empire list will give the coalition enough seats to secure it a small majority. The last Reichstag contained 423 members, of whom 110 belonged to the Government coalition.

ALLIES TO CONFER BEFORE SPA PARLEY

Italy Obdurate on Indemnity; No Mention of U. S.

PARIS, June 8.—The Spa conference between representatives of the Allies and Germany to be held July 5 will be preceded by a meeting of the heads of the allied Governments at Brussels on July 2, 3 and 4, it was stated today. The London correspondent of the Temps says to-day he learns that Premier Lloyd George expects to go to Paris about June 20 to confer with Premier Millerand on certain questions regarding the division of the German indemnity, which will be considered in the Spa conference, Italy having raised objections to the agreement reached last December between France and Great Britain. Under this agreement eleven-twentieths of the sum total was to go to France, three-twentieths to Great Britain and the remainder to the other Allies.

FACTIONS IN CHINA AGREE ON PEACE

Definite Conditions Settled Uniting North and South.

SHANGHAI, June 7 (delayed).—Definite agreement upon terms of peace between northern and southern China has been arrived at between Wang Ying-tang, northern plenipotentiary peace delegate, and the southern leaders, Wu Ting-fang, Tang Shao-yi, former Premier of the Peking Government, and Dr. Sun Yat-sen. Although peace delegates of both sides have been here for nine months they met for the first time in formal conference yesterday.

SHOES CHEAPER IN ST. LOUIS

St. Louis, June 8.—Reductions in the wholesale prices of various styles of shoes from 25 cents to \$2 a pair, were announced to-day by officials of three of the largest shoe manufacturing establishments here. Officials of the three establishments emphasized that the new prices were not the result of an agreement by the three firms.

130,000 Japanese in America

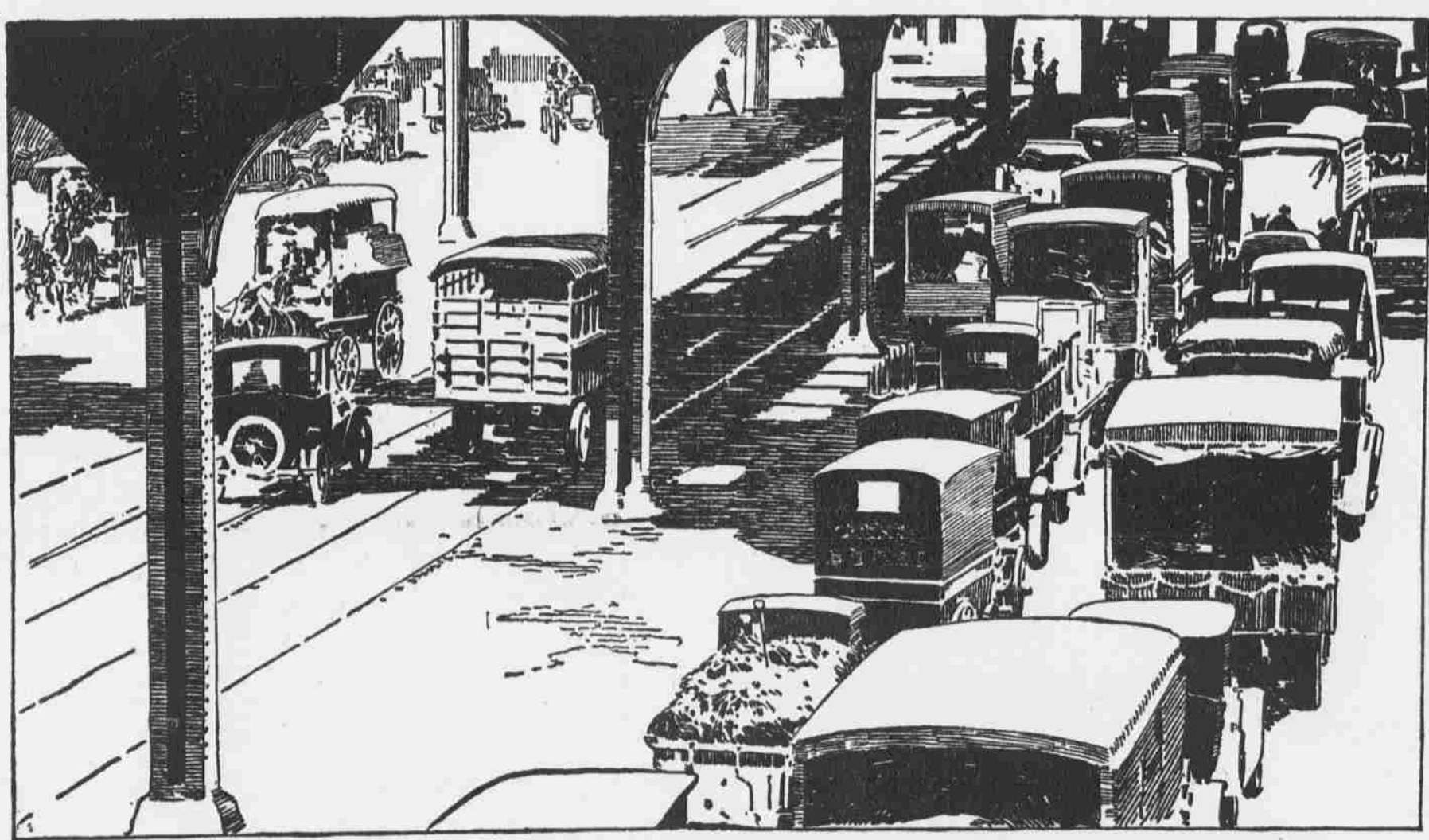
TOKYO, June 8.—According to investigations of the Foreign Office 130,000 Japanese are living in the United States, 110,000 in Hawaii, 59,000 in China proper, 31,000 in Brazil and 70,000 in other countries, the total being 580,000. This is an increase of 90,000 as compared with 1914.
