

BERLIN TO FIGHT CUT IN ITS ARMY, PLEADING PERIL

Compliance With Demand
of Allies Will Bring Catastrophe, Say Officials.

NEED MORE THAN POLICE

Strong Appeal Based on Political Unrest Will Be Made to Spa Conference.

Berlin, June 25.—The reduction of the Reichswehr, even if regarded in the light of an increase in the German police force as established by the Allies' note to the German Government insisting upon the reduction of the German army, is considered in official circles as pushing Germany to the brink of calamity. The Government will raise the sharpest kind of protest in reply and will be prepared to make the most energetic representations at the Spa conference.

The dissolution of the safety police and their replacement by the so-called "blue police," is held to be impossible in order to be preserved. Germany is

seething with political unrest likely to break into violence at any point at any time. Not only the reactionaries but the radical revolutionaries have military training and can be dealt with only by some stronger organization than the local police. This argument is based, it is explained, on the experience of the last few months, when the local police proved their incapability and regular military measures were required to restore order.

At the foreign office it is claimed that the safety police are unqualified for regular military service, but their work could not be done by any but trained and mobile young men. The reduction of the Reichswehr has been so long postponed that to the German Government it seems impossible that the command of the Entente could be obeyed by July 13. The Reichswehr is in bad temper, fearing the loss of employment, and in the reductions already made there have been manifestations of mutiny.

DISARMAMENT MUST GO ON, BERLIN TOLD

Allies Send 3 Notes on Subject to Peace Envoys.

Berlin, June 25.—Three notes dealing principally with the question of German disarmament have been received by the President of the German peace delegation. The first outlines many infringements of the military clauses of the peace treaty, saying the Allies have determined Germany shall carry out the terms and that their decision to reduce the German army to 100,000 men still stands.

The security police, this note adds, must be disbanded within three months, but gives permission for the disciplinary force to be increased to 150,000. Demand is made that the German constitution be made to conform with these military stipulations, so that conscription may be abolished by law. In conclusion the note asks that legal measures be taken against the export of war materials.

Details for the substitution of 150,000 disciplinary police for the security police are supplied in the second note.

TURKISH ARMY CORPS CAPTURED BY GREEKS

Continue Advance in Asia Minor Against Nationalists.

LONDON, June 25.—The Greek Legation here has received official information that the Greeks campaigning against the Turkish Nationalists in the Smyrna district surrounded a Turkish army corps in Philadelphia (Aia-Shehr, eighty-three miles east of Smyrna), taking 8,000 prisoners, with guns and other booty.

Smyrna, June 25.—The Greek army, which on June 21 began an offensive against the forces of Mustafa Kemal Pasha, is continuing successfully to advance northward in Asia Minor. It was announced in the Greek Army Headquarters communiqué, which says: "The Thirteenth Division attacked Sahilli and Lake Marmora Pass yesterday, it occupied Sahilli at 6.30 P. M., carried the pass by assault and cleared both districts. A cavalry column has advanced toward Yeala."

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 25.—The Turkish Nationalists still are pressing the Asiatic shores of Marmora in the vicinity of Constantinople and are directing a great concentration toward Smyrna. Apparently the plan of the followers of Mustafa Kemal Pasha is to harness the Greeks as much as possible in Thrace and the English opposite Constantinople to prevent them from sending reinforcements to the Greeks in the Smyrna district, where, it is be-

lieved here, the Nationalists will attack in force if the Peace Conference persists in giving Smyrna to the Greeks.

Turkish peace delegation in Paris has been instructed that the Turkish Government will uncompromisingly refuse to sign any peace treaty which deprives Turkey of the Smyrna district, Adrianople or eastern Thrace. In the main, it is indicated, the Government agrees with the other territorial limitations fixed by the Entente, but asks that Turkey be given representation on the international commission governing the straits and also on other commissions created for the regulation of Turkish affairs.

The Turkish Government consents to have portions of Erzerum, Bitlis and Van provinces given to Armenia, but insists that Armenia's Black Sea port be outside of Turkey and asks financial compensation for the territory given Armenia.

Turkey insists that it is willing to accept a settlement according to the Wilsonian principles and the spirit of the League of Nations, but declares no Turkish Government could live if it signed the present treaty.

V. S. Red Cross in Danger.

Rome, June 25.—A detachment of the American Red Cross that asked permission from the Italian High Commissioner at Aviona, Albania, to proceed to Fieri, north of Aviona, divided itself into small parties, according to Albanian advisers to-day, and the Italian command declined responsibility from any harm that might result from such a division.
