

HARD FOR GERMANY TO SUPPLY COAL

Herr Hue Off to Ruhr Basin to Urge Increased Production.

 Spa, Belgium, July 12 (by telephone to London).—The coal experts of the conference, having failed to reach an agreement on the demand by the Allies for 2,000,000 tons of coal from Germany, have ended their conference. The decision rests with the delegates. The German experts leave Spa to-night. Herr Hue, an official of the German miners' organization, goes to the Ruhr Basin to explain the situation to the miners there and to try to obtain an increase in their production.
 "One must realize that a great majority of the German miners are Socialists and anti-militarists, who have every desire to come to a peaceful understanding with the rest of the world," he told the correspondent of THE SUN and NEW YORK HERALD. "They regard the French miners as unable to produce enough coal because of the military destruction of their mines, and their German comrades want to relieve them in every way possible."
 "But the question of increasing production is a difficult one for several reasons. The first is the shortage of food in Germany and then comes the inefficiency of the transportation which we must cope with, as well as the consequences of German coal prices being below the world's market price.
 "Every September and October, when our harvest is being moved, there always is a block in transport and even at other times the Belgian railroads are not up to the task of delivering coal shipments promptly. It is hard to convince German workers of the need of working overtime when they can see the sidings blocked full of cars which cannot be gotten on the main line.
 "The treaty requires us to give coal

REDS NEAR MINSK; WARSAW ALARMED

 pedition to combat typhus, has called a meeting to organize a chapter of the American Legion. At the meeting the question of offering the services of the legion to the Polish Government will be discussed. The legion members will guard the American property and look after Americans who may remain in Warsaw if the Bolsheviks arrive here. It is estimated that there are 200 Americans, former service men, in Warsaw.
 The American relief associations, the Red Cross, the Young Men's Christian Association and the typhus expedition have in warehouses in Warsaw various supplies valued at millions of dollars.
 The Catholic Archbishop here has appealed to members of the church to join the colors. The Russian residents of Warsaw have held a mass meeting and begun the organization of infantry and cavalry detachments to fight the advancing Bolsheviks.

RUSSIA MAKES PEACE WITH LITHUANIA

Agree on Boundaries, Indemnity and Chief Cities.

 Moscow, July 10.—Lithuania and the Soviet Government of Russia have reached an agreement relative to the establishment of peace, said Adolf Joffe, representative of the Soviet Government in the negotiations, to-day. He said this agreement included an understanding as to boundaries and indemnity, and that Russia recognized Lithuania's rights to Vilna, Kovno and Grodno, as well as parts of the province of Grodno which are ethnographically Lithuanian.
 "This mutual understanding," he said, "was accelerated by the reverses suffered by the Polish forces. Russia will not interfere in boundary disputes involving the Polish, Latvian or German frontiers."

TWO PRUSSIAS VOTE AGAINST POLAND

Plebiscites Are Overwhelmingly in Favor of Remaining German.

LONDON, July 12.—A Berlin message to-day says it is announced there that the result of the plebiscites in West Prussia and East Prussia show an overwhelmingly German majority. The dispatch states that 92 per cent. of the votes in West Prussia and 88 per cent. of those in East Prussia favored Germany. The figures given are as follows:
 West Prussia (29 small districts missing).
 For Germany 91,424
 For Poland 7,682
 East Prussia (53 small districts missing).
 For Germany 955,665
 For Poland 7,488

The plebiscites mentioned in the foregoing were provided for in the Treaty of Versailles to determine the boundaries of Poland with regard to East and West Prussia. A Paris despatch on May 21 said the Council of Ambassadors had fixed the date for the holding of these plebiscites, but that the council had decided not to make the date public until the measures to be taken for organizing the control of the voting had been worked out. Since that time no announcement has been received as to the date of the voting.

TRUCE ON ALAND ISLANDS.

Swedes and Finns to Await Action of League of Nations.
 LONDON, July 12.—The Council of the League of Nations has decided to refer the question of the Aland Islands to a commission of three international jurists, who will be nominated by the President of the League.
 The Swedish and Finnish Governments have agreed to abstain from any action likely to aggravate the situation, pending the decision of the jurists.

to the Allies at the prices obtaining in Germany. This is an imposition which already has cost us dearly, for we have had to buy food from neutral countries at the world's prices and we have had to import coal at world's prices to supply some of our own industries, which normally used German coal. Now it is apparent that we cannot pay for food from neutral countries with coal shipments and that we must depend on the Allies for our food.
 "It will be impossible to pay for this food at the world's market prices and then deliver coal to the Allies for only a third of the world's price."

BRITISH ARMY QUITS BATUM.

London War Office Confirms Report of Evacuation.
 London, July 12.—The War Office confirms the British evacuation of Batum.

The People's Commission for Foreign Affairs of the Azerbaijan Soviet republic have agreed to transfer French, British and other allied prisoners of war from present prisons to better quarters, according to despatches from Batum received here yesterday at the Near East Relief headquarters.
